49 Five Thousand Eighty-One Dollars \$3,105,081 for general municipal operations. This article does not

include appropriations contained in special or individual articles addressed separately. (Majority voterequired).

52 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Fifty Thousand
53 Dollars (\$650,000) for the purpose of purchasing a Fire Truck. Three Hundred Twenty Three
54 Thousand Eight Hundred Thirty-Seven Dollars (\$323,837) to come from an assistance to firefighters
55 grant, and Three Hundred Twenty-Six Thousand One Hundred Sixty-three Dollars (\$326,163) to

To qualify, the person must have been 70 71 a New Hampshire resident for at least 3 consecutive years, own the real estate individually or jointly, 72 or if the real estate is owned by such person's spouse, they must have been married to each other for at least 5 consecutive years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than 73 \$32,500 or, if married, a combined net income of less than \$45,000; and own net assets not in excess 74 of \$75,000 excluding the value of the person's residence. (Majority vote required). 75

12. To see if the Town will modify the provisions of RSA 72:37-b, Exemption for the Disabled from property tax, based on assessed value for qualified taxpayers to be \$75,000. To qualify the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years, own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by such person's spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 consecutive years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$32,500 or if married, a combined net income of not more than \$45,000, and own net assets not in excess of \$75,000 excluding the value of the person's residence. (Majority vote required)

Energy Committee will be getting final quotes this week and recommends that the warrant article be 105 increased. After discussing the two options, Bob made a motion to amend the proposed warrant 106

article from \$10,000 to \$14,000. Cheryl seconded the motion. All in favor by roll call, motion 107 carried. 108

Jim Miller questioned that 3 of the salaried positions had been overspent. Bob explained that the 112 budget is a bottom-line budget, and the 2021 budget was underspent. Most of the departments were 113 shorthanded for the majority of the year, and as an acknowledgment, they gave them year-end 114 bonuses.

Al asked that was if it was money that was leftover in the budget that was used to compensate the 117 employees. The Board explained yes, it was. 118

120 Al asked why there were wages in the Deputy Town Clerk budget line when there is no Deputy. The money has been budgeted in case Sam is able to hire another Deputy. Ken explained that Jamie is 121 still the Deputy and works a few times a month. Al asked what happens to the money left over in the 122 budget. Bob explained that it goes into the unreserved fund balance and can be used to buy down the 123 tax rate.
