FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Friends,

Quite a few years ago, in the beginning years of my ministry in Mason, NH, a parishioner came to see me. She was the 40 year old mother of three boys, a bright and accomplished CFO of a large corporation, and she had struggled through surgery and chemotherapy for the treatment of breast cancer. Her visit was prompted because the cancer had recurred, and she was quite ill. One of the things that Carol (I've changed her name) did was to make all the arrangements for what would transpire when she died. Dispersal of her estate, funeral and burial details were as prepared as they could be. Carol talked with me about how her family and some close friends were shocked by her clear ability to accept her probable death in the near future. They thought that settling such details was to embrace her mortality, prematurely, and was excessively morbid.

On the contrary, as Carol said, "I told them that I feel free to enjoy the life that I have, right now, not fretting about unresolved details. I'm able to be with those who matter to me, while I'm here with them." This talk occurred in the late 1980's. Carol died within a year after this conversation. And, it is true that she fully engaged, as much as possible, the life that remained for her.

During this conversation, talking with Carol about her death, as we neared the end of our time, she asked, "So, Bill, about your writing, how is it going?" I said, "Oh, you know, I'm so busy. I'll need to wait until I have time." I can still feel her eyes locking on mine as she said, "Oh, really, when you have time?"

I wish I could say to you, dear friends, that the times I've been blessed with conversations like this, all my adult life, made me more productive and intentional with my writing. I'm afraid it hasn't. But I think I've become more conscious about the questions of what makes life meaningful, what gives us joy, and that carries into my work.

Many of us in Canterbury are reading Atul Gawande's recent book, "Being Mortal, Medicine and What Matters in the End". It is a brilliant reflection on our mortality, and of our difficulty in asking these guestions. Gawande, as a surgeon at Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston, brings a special focus to his writing. If you're more inclined to watch a film instead of reading a book, PBS's Frontline showed a documentary on February 10 bearing the same title, "Being Mortal". I've seen it and it is superb.

As we enter the season of Lent, I invite you to let me know what you are thinking if you read Gawande's book, or watch the documentary, or care about these questions. I'll be glad to listen.

TOWN HISTORY COMMITTEE HOSTS FOCUS GROUP

Fourteen interviewer volunteers met with Kathryn Grover on February 14th to discuss approaches to the writing of the New Town History. The three hour session was a follow-up to the Meg Heckman training on interviewing held in January. The Trustees have approved the expenditure of up to \$500.00 to purchase two audio recorders, possibly with lapel microphones, to be used by the New History Book committee in recording oral interviews.

The Society's One Room Schoolhouse Committee has voted to host 2nd graders from Belmont's Elementary School in its One Room school house program. There will be four classes of students who will attend on four different days in the Spring. This unique day is made possible with the cooperation and support of the Society, Belmont and Canterbury Elementary school principals and staff, as well as a host of volunteers, many retired educators, who have helped to make this nationally recognized program grow over its 7 years of existence.



HISTORY of the TOWN BALLOT BOX

During the eighteen plus years that I have served as town moderator, I have been asked repeatedly what the history of the ballot box is that is used at town elections. I am a little slow on the uptake at times, Ruth will confirm this, but I recently started researching the history of our town ballot box. This is what I have learned.

The box is missing a handle. It also is missing a crest which said "The Federal". On the front of the box is a patent plate with the dates, under where the crest should be, with the dates July 30, 1889 and August 19, 1890. The latter date refers to a patent issued in that year for a "registering and canceling device", more on that later.

Prior to 1890 New Hampshire had no state wide voting program. Political parties printed their own ballots, votes were bought and sold, and fraud was rampant. In 1891 the state legislature took action passing a law requiring the following. *"The secretary of state shall provide every city and town with a ballot box for use at each polling place. Said boxes shall be approved by the secretary, treasurer and attorney general of the state or a majority of them; shall have sufficient and secure locks and keys and shall be provided with a bell and mechanical devices for receiving, registering and canceling every ballot deposited therein (this may be what the 1890 patent was about); but no such box shall record any number or mark upon any ballot by which said ballots can be distinguished from each other".*

In 1892 New Hampshire held its first state wide secret ballot election. The ballot was designed after the ballot used in Australia. Thus our ballot is referred to as the "Australian Ballot".

Through an e-mail "list serve" which New Hampshire Moderators use to communicate with each other, I learned that many towns still have, and many still use, the ballot box which was purchased many years ago by the state. There is at least one that still has an operating "registering and canceling device". The box is located in Eaton, NH. Last fall, Ruth and I traveled to Eaton to look at their ballot box. Sure enough, Eaton still has an operating ballot box as described in the 1891 law. I took numerous pictures and have incorporated them into a folder.

So, when you come to vote on March 10th, be sure to ask to see the photos and we can discuss how the Canterbury Ballot Box has changed over the years.

Robert Alan Lockwood, son of Arthur and Ann (Millis) Lockwood, died Sunday, Feb. 15, 2015, at his home in Canterbury.

He was born and raised in Concord and graduated from Concord High School in 1950. He received a Bachelor's degree from UNH in 1958, and went on to receive a Master's degree from Boston University. He served in the U.S. <u>Army</u> during the <u>Korean Conflict</u> and worked at the family's Lockwood Young concrete plant before going to work for the Concord Monitor, where he served as a reporter and as City Editor.

In 1969 he joined Blue Cross & Blue Shield as Director of Public Relations where he worked until his retirement in 1994. He was on the original committee that formed the Shaker Regional School District, served as Chairman of the School Board, and as school district moderator. In 1986 he was elected to the NH House of Representatives where he served until 1998. He was the publicity chairman for the Canterbury fair for many years and wrote The History of the Canterbury Fair. He was a member of the Canterbury Players who produced 10 Gilbert & Sullivan plays. He assisted at his children's sporting events as an avid fan and, later, as his grandchildren's greatest cheerleader.

In addition to his wife, he is survived by his children, a son, Alan and his wife, Lois Lockwood of Tempe, Ariz., a son, Caleb Lockwood of Belmont, a daughter, Lucyann and her husband, Rick Zeller of Canterbury, a son, Briggs and his wife, Laurie Lockwood of Canterbury and a daughter, Polly and her husband, Jon Camire of Canterbury; and 10 grandchildren. Family also includes sisters, Peta Chandler and Patti Blanchette of Florida, a brother, Bill and his wife, Kathy Lockwood of Virginia, and several nieces and nephews.

A memorial service was held on Saturday, Feb. 21, at 1 p.m., at the Canterbury United Community Church.




