

FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Friends,

If you are familiar with Garrison Keillor's Prairie Home Companion radio show on Saturday evenings, then perhaps you know of his Lake Wobegon monologue about the July 4 Parade. It seems that every year the citizens of this little town, a town that time forgot and the decades cannot improve, make a living American flag on Main St. during the Fourth of July Parade. If I recall, the problem with the flag is that, since everyone is in it, no one can see it. So, the solution was to have each person take a turn climbing up to a nearby rooftop, so she or he could look down on the beauty of the living flag.

Small towns with vibrant community life have that nice problem, don't they? We see each other in numerous places over the course of any week. When we need to visit the Post Office, the Country Store, the Library, or the Town Offices we inevitably meet others. Some we know and others we meet for the first time, but the expectation is, unless we bury our chins on our chests and stare at the floor, that we will at least acknowledge our neighbor. "How are things with you?" Everyone participates somehow to make up the fabric of our town in countless ways throughout the year.

Encounter and loving acceptance is the advice given throughout the Bible, from a wandering Aramean named Abraham in the Hebrew Scriptures to Jesus in the Gospels. In what seems like a perfect inversion of today's popular wisdom, the pursuit of self-interest alone, a small town like Canterbury practices the ancient art of loving kindness (hesed in Hebrew, metta in Sanscrit, it's universal), knowing deep down that considering the interest of our neighbor benefits us as well.

And without a large building on Main Street to climb for a view, all we can do is keep making the flag, in its various shapes and colors, over and over again, and know in our hearts that we are part of it.

Toddler Time: for ages 2 and under - good fun in the shade of the Church. Bubbles and board books are available.


Water Relay - for ages 3-5 years however younger ones might like to try too!

The Cemetery Trustees recently completed their semi-annual inspection of Canterbury's cemeteries. They are pleased to report that most of them are in excellent condition, reflecting favorably on the efforts of their keepers.

In 2013 the Cemetery Trustees initiated a program whereby town citizens were invited to help maintain/preserve 32 of Canterbury's 34 cemeteries. (The town's DPW maintains the Maple Grove Cemetery and Shaker Village cares for the Shaker Cemetery.) The program has 36 volunteers who currently care for (and, in some cases, have improved) many of these cemeteries. There are, at present, a small number of cemeteries which need "keepers". A "Cemetery Keeper" is asked to provide basic care so as to preserve the general appearance and good order of their cemetery. Special tools are not required. The Cemetery Trustees are willing to provide assistance if required, including any substantial mowing or heavy work. If you wish to volunteer as a "keeper of a cemetery" please contact Cemetery Trustee John Goegel at 783-4079 or jtgoegel@gmail.com.

The 2013 Canterbury Town Report has an excellent overview of Canterbury's vast network of cemeteries. Caveat – Many cemeteries are small family plots and are located on private property. Visiting these cemeteries requires the permission of land owners.

Two events involving our cemeteries should be noted. On Memorial Day American flags were placed at the graves of our town's military veterans. At that time a Canadian flag was placed at the grave of Ian Gillespie, a World War II Canadian naval veteran.

Gordon Jackson, Dale Caswell and Sandy Morris were recently honored for their significant contribution over many years to the improvement/preservation of the Center Cemetery. Ken Folsom (town manager) and Cheryl Gordon (selectwoman) presented each of these gentlemen with a copy of a painting of the Center Cemetery by Kate Goegel.

First I would like to tell you about a blood drive here at the Fire Station on July 11th. There will be posters at the Store, Town office, and transfer station soon.

Thanks to everyone for being careful during the extreme fire weather conditions we had. It looks like we are out of the woods for a while or at least until fall. Keep an eye on the Smokey sign in front of the fire station; it will tell you what class day it will be so you know when you can burn. We are now issuing burn permits and they can be picked up at the fire station from 7:30 to 4:00 each day Monday through Friday. Also you can call the fire station on weekends. There is someone here most weekends. 783-4798

Update on the replacement of our old Engine One. We are looking at several options, trying to keep the price as low as possible and still get the Engine that we need to do the job. As I have mentioned before The E-One Engine has been a great truck for Canterbury, but nothing lasts forever, and it's time to replace it. The challenge is to have a truck built and keep the cost within our limits and still have a workable piece of fire apparatus that will be here for many years. We are working with a few Truck Venders to do just that. I can't go into great detail but I did want you to know we are working hard to bring you a replacement cost we can all live with.

A reminder of the Fire truck rides for the kids at the center in the morning on the 4th of July. We will also be on hand for the fair the last Saturday of July. Come by and see us.
