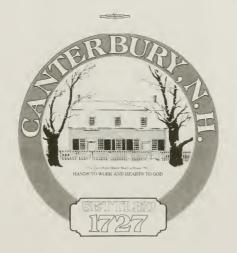

THE 2008 ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TOWN OF CANTERBURY IS DEDICATED TO DALE CASWELL IN RECOGNITION OF HIS 20 YEARS OF SERVICE AS CHIEF OF THE CANTERBURY VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT.



Dale Caswell was and is a dedicated public servant, retiring in 2008 having served a total of 25 years on the Canterbury Volunteer Fire Department, 20 of those years as Chief. Dale's tenure as Chief saw the overall demand for fire and rescue services double and the demand for emergency medical services triple. In response to these demands, Dale initiated first responder training for Canterbury firefighters and greatly improved the emergency medical capabilities of the department. Another of Dale's many significant achievements was securing the grant for the new rescue truck and then designing and obtaining this magnificent asset for the Town. Though he has retired as Chief, Dale continues to volunteer his services to the department and serves as Deputy Fire Warden for the Town

In an era marked by dwindling community participation and diminished volunteerism, Dale's quarter century of dedication to the safety and well-being of the citizens of Canterbury truly stands out. A grateful community salutes you and wishes you well in your well-earned retirement.

WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

The polls will be open from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Canterbury in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Canterbury Town Hall in said Canterbury on said Tuesday, the Tenth day of March, 2009 at seven o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

SECOND SESSION

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The second session will be held at the Canterbury Elementary School on Friday, the thirteenth day of March, 2009, at seven o'clock in the evening to act on the following subjects:

- 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred seventy five thousand dollars (\$175,000) for the replacement of the culvert located on Intervale Road and to authorize the issuance of not more than one hundred seventy five thousand dollars (\$175,000) worth of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33) and to authorize Municipal Officials to negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon. Two-Thirds Ballot Vote Required. Recommended by Selectmen.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a three year Municipal Lease/Purchase Agreement for the purpose of purchasing a cruiser, with the equipment, for the Police Department and to raise and appropriate the sum of nine thousand six hundred sixty five dollars and sixteen cents (\$9,665.16) after trade in for the first year's payment. The lease will not contain a "non-appropriation clause." This is a Special Warrant Article. Two-Thirds Ballot Vote Required. Not Recommended by the Selectmen.

- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for interest on Tax Anticipation Notes.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 to update all of the Current Use records and to appropriate the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) as an initial funding amount. Furthermore, name the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend from this Capital Reserve Fund. This is a Special Warrant Article. Recommended by the Selectmen.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand twenty one dollars and eighteen cents (\$3,021.18) for the purchase of (4) 6.5' X 12' aluminum soccer nets. **Petitioned Warrant Article.** *Not Recommended by the Selectmen.*
- 7. To raise such money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of two million two hundred thirteen thousand three hundred seventeen dollars and thirty seven cents (\$2,213,317.37) for the same.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to organize a Fire Department, and other public safety related services according to RSA 154:1, I (b) whereby the Fire Chief will be appointed annually by the Selectmen to a one-year term and the firefighters will be appointed by the Selectmen, upon the recommendation of the Fire Chief. The Canterbury Volunteer Fire Department, Inc. (CVFD) will continue to exist as a fraternal organization, but will have no operational authority over the newly created Fire Department. All apparatus and equipment presently in use by the CVFD has been, and will continue to be, the property of the Town of Canterbury. Further, the Fire Chief shall be recommended to the Selectmen for appointment under the provisions of RSA 154:1, II, allowing the recommendation of the Fire Chief by the Volunteer Firefighters and Volunteer Emergency Medical Technicians of the Canterbury Fire Department. *Recommended by the Selectmen*.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Canterbury Agricultural Commission, pursuant to RSA 673:4-b, RSA 674:44 and RSA 674:44-f. The Commission shall consist of not less than three (3) nor more than seven (7) regular members and up to five (5) alternates may be appointed. Recommended by the Selectmen.

10. To see if the Town will vote to direct the Selectmen to utilize State and Federal funds to maximize energy efficiency in town buildings and cut municipal energy cost. Petitioned Warrant Article.

To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

MARCH 11, 2009

Town elections were held March 11, 2008 at the Canterbury Town Hall.

Wayne Mann, Moderator called the meeting to order at 7:00 a.m. A motion was made by Cheryl Gordon to dispense with the reading of the warrant. The motion was seconded by Janice Stout. Motion was passed by majority vote.

Selectmen Robert Steenson and Briggs Lockwood were present to verify that the ballot box was empty.

Necessary town officers for the year ensuing were chosen by ballot.

The meeting was recessed at 7:00 p.m. The ballots were counted and the results were as follows:

SECOND SESSION

Wayne Mann, Moderator, opened the recessed 266th Canterbury Town Meeting at 7:00 p.m. on the 14th of March. The American Flag was presented by Chief John LaRoche, Officer Mark Ashland and Sergeant Ernest Beaulieu. All joined in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance.

The moderator presented his instructions for the conduct of the meeting and the location of all fire exits was noted. The Moderator introduced the Town Officials on the podium: Paula Harper, Deputy Town Clerk/Tax Collector, Cheryl Gordon, Town clerk/Tax Collector, Selectmen Robert Steenson, Kenneth Folsom, Briggs Lockwood and Town Administrator, Roger Becker.

The Moderator gave a brief overview of the Town Report cover and also noted that the Town Report, itself, was dedicated to Frank Tupper.

The Moderator reminded the voters that most of the people who serve on various Town committees do so as volunteers. This announcement resulted in a round of applause.

John Scarponi thanked Fire Chief Caswell and congratulated him on his retirement. He then requested that we take a moment to thank Chief Caswell which resulting in a round of applause for the Chief's years of service to the people of Canterbury.

Wayne Mann announced the election results and the results of the 2 questions on the ballot, both questions passed.

Moderator Mann announced that the Boy Scouts were selling refreshments at the back of the hall.

Announcement of procedures:

The moderator explained that only registered voters may speak and then with a limit of three (3) minutes. Registered voters will have only one turn per amendment and should raise their hands to speak. The moderator asked if all

registered voters had their yes/no cards and the paper ballot that they received when checking in.

The moderator discussed Inserts to the town report.

ARTICLE 4.

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred sixty one thousand dollars (\$261,000) for the purchase of a parcel consisting of two contiguous lots on Kimball pond road known as Hildreth's field, together 45 acres, tax map 8 lot 037.000 and tax map 8 lot 037.001 and to further authorize the issuance of up to one hundred thirty thousand five hundred dollars (\$130,500) of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA33) to authorize the selectmen to apply for, obtain and accept federal, state or other aid, if any, which may be available for said project and to comply with all laws applicable to said project: and to authorize the Board of selectmen to issue negotiate sell and deliver such bonds or note and to determine the rate of interest thereon further to authorize the withdrawal of seventy five thousand five hundred dollars (\$75,000) from the Conservation Commission Fund and fifty five thousand dollars (\$55,000) from the Conservation Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose. Two Thirds ballot vote required. Recommended by the Selectmen.

Motion Douglas Russwick, Second John Bouton

Jennifer Taylor, Chairwoman of the Conservation Commission, spoke in favor of the motion. Jennifer stated that the Commission had considered its scenic view, centralized open space, and watershed issues as part of their criteria for selecting this parcel. It is currently assessed at \$261,000. If the article passes this evening, there is an anonymous pledge from a Canterbury resident of \$5,000.00. The funding for the land will be provided by a general obligation bond with a face value of \$130,500, seventy five thousand five hundred dollars (\$75,500) from the conservation commission fund and fifty five thousand dollars (\$55,000) from the conservation capital reserve fund created for this purpose. The five thousand dollar donation will be used to offset the first year's principal payment.

Mr. Doug Russwick could not find the \$55,000 and \$75,000 amounts referenced in the Town Report. Selectmen Bob Steenson said that on page 43 of the Town Report you could find the balances for the two funds: the Conservation Commission Capital Reserve Fund has a current balance of \$65,853.24 and the Conservation Fund has a balance of \$88,500.

John Scarponi asked the selectmen if they were in favor of the article and why.

Selectmen Steenson said the Board was unanimously in favor of the purchase, finding the \$261,000 purchase price as being reasonable and "too good to

pass up." We already have \$130,000 and only need to bond half, adding 6 cents to the tax rate in the first year and tapering off to 4 cents in the tenth year. The Selectmen are also concerned about safeguarding the water resources of the town. Referencing RSA36-A, Selectman Briggs Lockwood read a part of the legislation offering what is deemed appropriate for the Conservation Commission to purchase in the name of the Town. This land fits the description listed in the RSA relating to Conservation Commissions.

Judy Nelson questioned if the amount of the bond will be reduced by \$5,000 as a consequence of the anonymous donation. Selectmen Steenson and Jen Taylor of the Conservation Commission agreed that the donation would be used to reduce the first year's principal payment.

Ken Stern, Emily Brunkhurst, Darrell Covell and Howard Moffett spoke in favor of the article.

Jamie Kotusky made a motion to vote. Darrell Covell seconded.

Kelly Short asked for clarification on how to mark the ballot. Portable voting boxes were passed throughout the crowd for the collection of ballots. Voting started at 7:35 p.m. Moderator Mann announced that the voting will close at 8:35 p.m.

ARTICLE 5.

To raise such money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations (\$2,139,023) for the same.

Point of order: Mike Capone questioned whether discussions and voting can occur when the voting for article 4 was still pending. Moderator Mann stated that it can.

Motion Ken Jordan, Second Jim Snyder

Bob Steenson explained that we must use "gross appropriations" when budgeting. For example, when accounting for the purchase of the new rescue truck last year, we should have shown the total purchase price as an expense with the grant money showing as revenue offsetting the expense. Bob noted that the Town Report was changed accordingly and the DRA requires this format for all budget line items and that voters should note these changes in all areas where there are grants or transfers from Trust Funds such as the Library budget. Bob Steenson spoke to some of the large increases in the budget explaining that many are related to increased cost in wages, healthcare and retirement. Also, adding to this is the Bookkeeper, Mary Hauptman, worked only five months last year and is budgeted for twelve months for 2008. Likewise, Town Administrator, Roger Becker, worked only two months for 2007 and is budgeted for twelve months in 2008. Thanks to Chief LaRoche we now have a fully manned police force. The recycling and transfer station budgets were discussed. The revenue from the recycling effort now almost completely covers the operating expenses

of the transfer station. The only other expenditures were the tipping fees. We do not foresee an increase in the price of Pay-As-You-Throw bags at this time.

A general discussion of the Fire Department budget ensued, focusing on the increase in the Reimbursement line item. The Fire Department approached the Selectmen with a proposal to convert to a Call Department and asked for \$50,000 to fund it in the first year. There is a general agreement that something needs to be done to compensate our volunteers for their efforts. The Selectmen increased the Reimbursement account from \$9,400 to \$20,000 for 2008 and have suggested that a committee be formed to study the approach best suited for Canterbury. The Committee will be charged with presenting a plan to be implemented in 2009.

Bob Scarponi asked for further clarification and was told that the committee would be providing that clarification at a later date. Reverend Mel Burrows questioned why \$2,500.00 was budgeted for voting machine programming' when only \$200 was budgeted for 2007. The answer lies in the fact that this is a Primary and Presidential election year, while last year there were only local elections. It was also explained that there is no one in Town capable of programming the voting machines, and that there are also security issues that need to be addressed when reprogramming the machines. Chris Booth raised the same issue and was given the same answer.

Ginny Litalalien questioned whether we have anyone who could program the voting machine; again, the security issues pretty much limit us to our current programming source.

Steve Wearn questioned why the Town Administrator's wages and health coverages were so much higher this year. Bob Steenson explained that the Town Administrator worked only two months last year, but is budgeted for twelve (12) months for 2008. It was also pointed out that the Town would be reimbursed for part of the health insurance coverage. Seth Kohn questioned if the highway budget was high enough. Bob Steenson said the town roads are better than state roads and that the budget increase for sand and gravel and should be sufficient for this year.

Derek Jackson asked what the subcontractor fee in the police budget represented. Bob Steenson answered that it represents wages paid to officers for extra details worked, for example providing police protection at the racetrack. Selectmen Steenson explained that the hiring agencies are billed more per hour than we pay out, so the Town ultimately takes in more revenue that it pays out in wages, to help defray the administrative costs of providing the service.

B.J. Entwisle questioned the total Revenue Offsets shown on page 23. Selectmen Bob Steenson explained that the number is related to all departments. As earlier explained, it is revenue that will be used to reduce the net cost to the Town of various projects that have been shown in the budget as a gross appropriation, to meet DRA and legislative budgeting rules.

Fred Ficken questioned what was being done about the graffiti in the center of the Town. The Town has \$1,000 deductable insurance, so our insurance will cover the cost exceeding \$1,000.

Steve Wearn asked about the \$15,000.00 budget item for the audit. Our previous auditor has resigned as of January 2008. The Town sent out RFP's to about six (6) CPA firms and received responses back from only two (2). Only one of the two offered a complete audit, and the estimate for that was \$14,000.

Bob Scarponi questioned the bond council fees for the bond issues. This is for the worst case scenario estimated by our bank.

There being no further questions the operating budget of \$2,139,023.21 was passed by a majority vote.

The Moderator, reading from the 1940 Town Report, related that the Town paid two individuals the sum of \$18.50 for winding the Town's clock for one year.

ARTICLE 6.

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum if seventy nine thousand five hundred dollars (\$79,500) for the purchase of a highway truck. **Recommended by the Selectmen.**

Motion Mike Capone, Second Leslie Keeler

Briggs Lockwood explained the truck being replaced is a 1996 Ford Dump Truck. There are further repair expenses coming up this year; the truck is having brake problems and is plagued with rust. They plan to replace it with an F550 which is "all wheel" drive. This newer truck will be quicker and more effective as a plow as it will be smaller in size. It could be harder to get and more expensive next year.

Donna Mueller stated that we voted to buy this truck last year and questioned why we didn't buy it last year. Briggs explained we bought a truck last year and we need another one this year.

Seth Kohn said last year's truck was \$51,000.00 and questioned why this truck is much more expensive. Selectmen Lockwood explained that last year we purchased an F350 and this year we contemplate an F550, a much bigger truck.

Ruth Heath asked what happens to the old truck. Selectmen Lockwood explained the old truck has a 5 yard sander mounted in its bed. The truck can be sold but we will keep the sander. The truck may go to the White Farm surplus auction.

Jim Miller questioned the proposed \$20,000 that is going into the Highway Truck capital reserve fund on page 22 and Judy Nelson asked if the budget is approved, will the \$20,000 offset any of the truck's purchase price. Briggs Lockwood explained that the \$20,000 will be used to rebuild the capital reserve fund for future highway trucks.

Susanne Dewitt asked if the new truck will not hold the old sander will we be getting a new sander. Briggs Lockwood said, yes, it is all included in the price of the truck.

Article 6 passed by a majority vote.

ARTICLE 7.

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eight thousand dollars (\$8,000) for the purpose if rebuilding the pump in engine three. Recommended by the Selectmen.

Motion Doug Russwck, Second Patti Capone

Derek Jackson asked if the pump was "bad" because of use or age. Chief Caswell stated that the pump is "bad" because of Canterbury water; the water is wearing the pump out. Additionally, the truck is 11 years old and has failed the pump test. The department received three (3) estimates and all three were in the vicinity of \$8,000.00 for the worst case scenario.

Priscilla Lockwood asked if we have a motion on the floor to discuss. Moderator Mann declared that we did.

Hardy Masse asked how long we plan to be keeping the truck. Bob Steenson said we are hoping another 10 plus years.

Kathy Fife asked if \$8,000 will be enough to cover the cost. Per Chief Caswell that is the top of the estimates.

Article 7 passed by a majority vote.

ARTICLE 8.

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for interest on Tax Anticipation Notes. **Recommended by the Selectmen.**

Motion Priscilla Lockwood, Second Laurie Lockwood

There is the potential that we will need to borrow twice in 2008 to cover cash flow shortages. Chris Booth stated we charge interest on late taxes and doesn't that offset it. Bob Steenson says yes, but the issue is one of cash flow; the timing of available cash and the demands for payment.

Article 8 passed by a majority vote.

ARTICLE 9.

To see if the town will modify the disabled exemption from property tax in the Town of Canterbury from \$35,000 to \$60,000 pursuant to RSA72:37-b the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years and own

and occupy the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by a spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In additional, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$13,400, or, if married, a combined net income of not more than \$20,400 and own net assets not excess of \$35,000 excluding the value of the person's residence, **Recommended by the Selectmen.**

Motion Judy Nelson, Second Al Edelstein

Bob Steenson stated this was an oversight from last year that needs to be corrected; this is simply a housekeeping measure so that the disabled exemption matches the elderly exemption.

Ernie Albert asked if marriage covers civil unions also. Bob Steenson replied that that is a legal question needing a response from Town Counsel. Leslie Keeler made a motion to revise the language. Bob Steenson said we can't change the language because the wording is dictated by statute.

Steve Wearn asked if all taxes could be exempted. Bob Steenson said that it is up to the Board of Selectmen, but it is also a legal issue. The Selectmen can do it case by case. Will the selectmen look into this for next year? Yes, was the answer from the Board.

Article 9 passed by a majority vote.

ARTICLE 10.

Shall the town accept the provisions of RSA 202-a: 4-c providing that any town at annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the public library trustees to apply for, and expend without further action by the meeting unanticipated money for state federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year? Recommended by the Selectmen.

Motion Leslie Keeler, Second Ron Turcotte

Bob Steenson explained that this is just a housekeeping issue. Peggy Bezanson questioned if they have to report the money? Yes, all money collected by the Town must be reported regardless of the source.

Article 10 passed by a majority vote.

Moderator Mann closed the polls for Article 4 at 8:35

Moderator announced the results of Article 4 to purchase Hildreth's Field on Kimball Pond Rd. Needed 2/3 majority to pass.

Passed. YES: 169 NO: 55

ARTICLE 11.

Shall the town accept the provisions of RSA 202-a:4d to authorize the public library trustees to accept gifts of personal property, other than money, which may be offered to the library for any public purpose, and such authorization shall remain in effect until rescinded in a vote at town meeting? No acceptance of any personal property under the authority of this section shall be deemed to bind the town of the library trustees to raise appropriate or expend any public funds for the operation maintenance repair or replacement of such personal property. Recommended by the Selectmen.

Moved Ken Jordan, Second Patti Capone

Fred Zeller asked if this money come with strings attached. Library Trustee Claudia Leidinger stated no.

Article 11 passed by a majority vote.

ARTICLE 12.

To see if the town will vote to approve the following resolution to be forwarded to our state representatives, our state senator and our Governor.

Resolved: We the citizens of Canterbury, NH believe in a New Hampshire that is just and fair. The property tax has become unjust and unfair. State leaders who take a pledge for no new taxes perpetuate higher and higher property taxes. We call on our State representatives, Our State Senator and Our Governor to reject the "Pledge", have an open discussion covering all options, and adopt a revenue system that lowers property taxes. By Petition.

Motion Patti Capone, Second Priscilla Lockwood

Priscilla Lockwood, State Representative, stated that the Legislature is trying to start the dialogue for a new tax structure.

Christopher Booth stated he is in opposition of this article; he is also against any new taxes.

Dave Noel spoke against any new taxes, having moved here from Vermont because New Hampshire has no sales or income tax.

Bob Steenson spoke in favor as he feels all options should be on the table.

Article 12 passed by majority vote.

ARTICLE 13.

To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Jim Miller spoke about cars parking on Baptist Road during town functions creating a traffic and safety hazard. He questioned if we can make parking available at the municipal building.

Ted West explained that because of the soils and wetlands in that area, creating additional parking is not possible.

Doug Russwick asked about plowing the back field at the School. Bob Steenson said that was a school issue. Bob stated Selectmen will talk to the school board about the parking situation.

David Tirrell-Wysocki stated that something needs to be done about parking; it's not safe with everyone parking on the road. Why not park on the pavement and beside the Municipal building? Bob Steenson will discuss matter with school board.

Barbara Slayton stated that there is plenty of parking at town hall and the Library you; you can simply park there and walk up the hill.

John Leggett had important announcement — The Boy Scouts are having a ½ price sale.

Seth Kohn wanted to thank Laurie Lockwood for her help at the Treasure House and for organizing volunteers. However, they still are in need of more volunteers.

Chris Booth announced that on April 21, 2008 a meeting of the Renewable Energy Committee has been scheduled.

A motion to dissolve the meeting was made at 8:56 p.m. Motion made by Dwight Keeler and Seconded by Jack Evans.

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ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

2008 was in many ways a record setting year for the Town of Canterbury. Record snowfalls, record elections; record energy costs, a record budget, a record ice storm and nationally a record economic meltdown all had and will continue to have significant impact on our town government and its citizens.

The winter months of 2008 set a record for storms and snowfall accumulations. Phil Stone, Jim Sawicki, David Heath, John O'Connor and Jason Barry toiled long days and nights plowing the roads and spent the few days that it didn't snow repairing overworked equipment. We thank them for their dedication to keeping our roads open and safe.

The unprecedented duration and intensity of the Presidential primary and general elections brought record numbers of new voter registrations and record voter turnout. Supervisors of the Checklist Mary Kerwin, Brenda Murray and Mary Ann Winograd, Town Clerk Cheryl Gordon, Assistant Town Clerk Paula Harper, Moderator Wayne Mann and all of our election day and election night volunteers worked hard to ensure a smooth and accurate electoral process.

The Board is pleased to report that all functions of town government and financial administration continued to improve under the watchful eye of Roger Becker in his first full year of service as Town Administrator. The goals outlined in last years report to improve bookkeeping and internal financial controls were met. A new purchase order policy was implemented, expenditure analysis was vastly improved and financial audit results from our new auditors were strong. We thank Roger, Jan Stout, Mary Hauptmann, Ben Bynum as well as Cheryl Gordon and Paula Harper not only for their hard work and excellent results but also for making Canterbury's government pleasant to deal with, responsive and respectful.

The record run-up in fuel prices and heating costs affected all town departments in 2008 as we simply did not budget for \$5 per gallon diesel, \$4 per gallon gasoline and \$3 per gallon propane. We thank the department heads for working closely with Roger and the Board to adjust spending and we acknowledge a job well done. Despite the energy costs, Chief LaRoche, Chief Angwin and Road Agent Stone *under spent* their budgets by \$6110, \$8844 and \$30,379 respectively!

The Police and Fire Departments each surpassed calls-for-service milestones in 2008 with the Fire Department logging a record 326 calls. The Board welcomed Pete Angwin as Fire Chief upon Dale Caswell's well-deserved retirement. We must all express our appreciation to this dwindling company of volunteers for their dedication to the safety and well being of the citizens of Canterbury.

The Police Department in John LaRoche's first full year as Chief responded to more calls and relied less on the State Police than ever before and significantly improved coverage on nights and weekends. We thank Chief LaRoche, Sgt. Beaulieu and the officers for their professionalism and the cheerful demeanor that they bring to their work.

The Board recognizes and is deeply grateful for the extraordinary efforts of the Fire Department Advisory Committee: Chair Ellen Bassett; Catherine Newick; Meg Miller; Ruth Mann; Bob Scarponi; Craig Briggs, Roger Becker; Ken Folsom and Pete Angwin. They spent hundreds of hours reviewing reams of data, researching the history and activity of our fire department, interviewing other towns' fire departments, consulting experts at the Local Government Center and completed a masterful analysis of Canterbury's fire and rescue needs and developed thorough, thoughtful and economical recommendations for the Town to consider.

The Town budget also surpassed a milestone in 2008, setting a record as the operating budget exceeded \$2,000,000 for the first time. The Board is certain that this sum seems inconceivable to many residents, especially those who remember operating budgets less than \$50,000! Unfortunately we see no end to the growth in local budgets and local property taxes as long as the current economic conditions prevail, the State continues to shift costs to the County and the current revenue structure remains in place. The Board is mindful that the property tax burden falls disproportionately on the economically disadvantaged, those suffering a healthcare or other crisis or simply living on a fixed income. Our challenge as a Board and a community is to balance the very real need to minimize this burden on the most vulnerable of our citizens against equally compelling requirements to provide safe roads and bridges, police, fire, emergency medical services and education for our children.

Finally the recent December ice storm once again showcased the Canterbury citizenry at their best as neighbors reached out to those in need, families shared generators, meals and all-important hot water with those without power. It is this spirit that continues to define Canterbury and will help us all as we work to meet the challenges ahead.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CANTERBURY VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

I would like to begin with thanking all the members that volunteer to serve on the fire department and their wives and children who give up quality time with their mom, dad, sister or brother. As Chief, I know all too well how many hours are spent trying to keep all safe and out of harms way. It is the Chief's job to see that the citizens of Canterbury are protected to the best of our ability. The demand on our volunteers is at a critical state, the call volume has overcome us as volunteers. In April or May of this year I informed the selectmen that we could no longer protect the citizens of Canterbury with the increase of calls and decrease of volunteers. Something had to be done as soon as possible. The Officers of the department has come up with a plan to a paid by call, along with reimbursement, but after discussions with the selectmen they decided we should have a committee to gather more data similar to the way they did for the Town Administrator. So a committee was formed by the Selectmen and many meetings and discussions took place as well as public meetings. What came out of all of this is we needed to start building a paid department to handle all of our emergency needs.

The call rate has steadily increased from around the mid 70's to present and has put a huge strain on the volunteers. You may be hearing this for the first time in any case please try to talk with a fire department member before the town meeting so you may be better informed as to why and what we are asking for. Over the years all the fire departments all over the country have tried to give their respective towns free emergency fire and medical service. But it appears the day of the volunteer firefighter is about over, and we need to look at fully funding the fire service, in the same way that we fund our Police, Highway and solid Waste Departments and the Town Administrator. The Fire Department realizes that this is a year when times are difficult and it is very important how we spend our tax dollars. I can't think of a better use of my tax dollars that for the protection and peace of mind that someone from Canterbury Fire will be there to help me if ever I should need them.

We are a community that prides itself on being a rural town with no industry or big business, but it does come with a price as we all know. Everyone has emergencies in life and we need someone to call, here it is our Fire Department because they offer trained Fire and Emergency personnel who can respond to your emergency quickly.

When I took over as Chief, I knew we had to take the Department in a new direction that meant more Emergency Medical service and more manpower to handle the increased call volume. We have increased our training load to include a higher standard of care by or EMT's. Seven of our emergency medical techni-

cians have just completed their "I" class which was an 80 hour course. This will give the town's people a much better level of care and is a huge boost to the department's medical team. We also had one firefighter complete Firefighter I certification at the Fire Academy and one who completed firefighter II. But, we did suffer a temporary loss of one of our Firefighters EMT to an auto accident responding to a call in town. We all hope he has a speedy recovery. All these changes create more work load and duties to perform by the administration which is already stretched too thin.

Your Fire Department responded to 326 calls this year, that's a 13.2% increase over last year. We fight all types of fires, house fires, car fires, chimney fires, brush fires, forest fires and respond to all types of medical calls, car accidents and natural disasters. We are always looking for people who want to serve.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CANTERBURY POLICE DEPARTMENT

2008 was a busy year for your police department. We had an increase in arrests and general calls for service over 2007. The statistics for the year are shown below. I thought that I could take this opportunity to explain the terms used in the chart. If I offend anybody by assuming that you would be interested in the explanation then I apologize ahead of time. With that being said an accident refers to a motor vehicle accident both those requiring a report to be sent to the DMV and those not requiring such notification. An arrest is what you probably think it is. It means a full custodial arrest requiring a booking and bailing. Calls for service are what we refer to when we deal with just about everything.

For example if you call us about a suspicious vehicle, that is a call for service, if we serve a subpoena to someone that is also a call for service. A call for service is also generated as a first step to an incident or an arrest or an accident. Citations refer both to motor vehicle warnings and summonses. Generally speaking the department writes more warnings than summonses. A field interview is generated when we have contact with someone that may be of some interest but that the contact did not rise to the level of a call for service or incident. An incident is some action that will require some follow up whether it leads to an arrest or not. For example we receive a call of a noise complaint (Call for Service), we speak with the complainant and learn that his neighbors have been fighting so we make contact with the neighbors. We discover that one of the neighbors was assaulted it has become an incident after further discussion we determine one of the subjects was what we call the primary aggressor and was arrested. Property means that property stolen, recovered, damaged or taken into custody. Lastly there were 3 arrest warrants issued by this department in 2008. I am unable to show stats from 2007 because we now use a different data collection system and track some items differently.

At any rate due to the increase in business, an increase that I believe will continue through 2009, I am trying to fund the third full time position that exists in the department structure. This position will replace one of the four part-time positions that the department has. Effectively you will have (3) full time officers and (3) part-time officers. The extra officer will allow me to more evenly cover the town for the hours that I believe the citizenry wants covered. As always I want you to remember that we are your department and can be reached, for any reason, at 228-1010 or 783-0433.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CANTERBURY RECYCLING COMMITTEE

Prior to the collapse of global commodity prices the recycling equation was quite simple. You could make money by selling paper, aluminum, plastic, and steel cans or you could spend money by shipping them to landfills or incinerators. Now it has become a choice between spending a little bit to send those materials to recyclers, or spending more to ship them to a landfill or an incinerator. It's still to your economic advantage to recycle, but now your choice is between a smaller expense and a bigger expense rather than between income and an expense.

This has implications for the budget. Instead of having recyclable materials offset the transfer station expenses, they will now add to them. At some point the equation will revert back but no one knows when that will be. Probably bag prices will have to increase to compensate for the loss of revenue.

Will an increased bag price lead to more people dropping out of the PAYT program and getting their own private dumpsters? From a budget standpoint it probably doesn't matter. When Bestway brings garbage from Canterbury dumpsters to the incinerator, the town charges them back for the tonnage plus adds a surcharge. From a financial standpoint the town would be better off if everyone got a private dumpster and we could scale back the transfer station to minimal hours and staff.

The Recycling Committee, however, is more concerned with the environmental aspects of recycling than with the financial aspects. With this is mind, we will be using the bulk of the money raised at the Dance at the Dump to fund a Recycling Appreciation Day on April 18. The first 350 people bringing in a bin of recyclables on that day can enter their name into a drawing from which 7 lucky winners will each be awarded \$50. Everyone participating in the annual road side clean up on that same day can enter their name as well, as can those who attend the Earth Day talk at the Town Hall April 19 at 4:00 P.M. where Don Maurer will discuss landfills, recycling, and single stream and will answer all of your recycling questions.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CANTERBURY HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The Rivers Management and Protection Program celebrated its twentieth anniversary with a commemorative poster. The poster features the upper Merrimack from the Route 4 bridge at the Boscawen/Canterbury/Concord line with a photograph taken by Steve Landry, Boscawen UMRLAC Representative.

The UMRLAC began implementing the *Upper Merrimack Management and Implementation Plan* with assistance from the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. The Commission worked with the UMRLAC to write a successful funding proposal to implement the buffers objective. This year the UMRLAC begins its thirteenth year of the Upper Merrimack Monitoring Program (UMMP). The UMMP owes much of its success to strong municipal support and that from its Adopt-a-River Site Sponsors. The Program's Adopt-a-River Site Sponsors include Aquarian Analytical Laboratories, Inc.; Aries Engineering, Inc.; Checkmate Expert Payroll Services; Elektrisola; Franklin Savings Bank; Franklin Wastewater Treatment Facility; Public Service of NH (both Corporate and Merrimack Station); and Watts Regulator/Webster Valve. The UMRLAC also thanks the Conservation Commissions and Towns and Cities of Boscawen, Bow, Canterbury, Concord, Franklin, and Northfield for their ongoing support. The support of these towns, cities, and Adopt-a-River Site sponsors made possible equipment and supply purchases as well as maintenance to protect existing investments such as the UMMP's stereoscopes. Special thanks go to St. Paul's School for graciously hosting UMRLAC's "Bug Nights" educational and research program, which continues its popularity in the region with dozens of individuals volunteering their collection and identification services.

The UMLRAC contracted with EcoAnalysts, Inc. to provide a data analysis and recommendations report related to the data collected in the Bug Nights program. This analysis will help guide the UMRLAC in its planning efforts for the next decade. The UMRLAC continued to review and provide comment on proj-

ect plans and proposals including the FERC relicensing for hydroelectric facilities on the Merrimack River, site specific and wetlands applications in the upper Merrimack six municipalities, state surplus land disposal, and a proposed landfill expansion. The UMRLAC also provided comments on several NH Department of Transportation proposals and pre-application process.

The UMRLAC elected the following slate of officers in November: Michele Tremblay, Chair; Steve Landry, Vice-Chair, Krista Crowell, Treasurer; and Gary Lynn, Secretary, The UMRLAC is pleased to welcome Brian Sullivan of Franklin

as the newest "UMRLACer."

The UMRLAC hosted several informational and educational presentations from experts on issues including legislation, invasive species, climate change adaptation, and the NH Natural Heritage Bureau. During the summer, the UMR-LAC hosted a public workshop in Canterbury on the revised Comprehensive Shoreland Protect Act. Several UMRLAC representatives participated in the annual Watershed Conference in November, Michele Tremblay presented a social marketing workshop.

Established in 1990, the Upper Merrimack River Local Advisory Committee (UMLRAC) has represented its six communities of Boscawen, Bow, Canterbury, Concord, Franklin, and Northfield in a variety of studies and planning activities related to the upper Merrimack River and its watershed. It serves as the area's advisory board on its designation in the NH Rivers Management and Protection

The third full year in the new Elkins Library was as successful as the first two. Circulation was up and new patrons were added. The number of interlibrary loans reached an all time high of over 900books. A downloadable audio book service was added through the State Library and the Gates Foundation. Internet usage, both for the library's computers and wireless access, increased as well.

Our summer reading program, "A G-Day for Reading" involved over 200 children in reading activities, crafts and a musical performance. At the kick off event Joe Carringer played the didgeridoo for 71 guests. At the Wildlife Encounter with Down Under Animals, 178 children and their parents got to see all sorts of Australian mammals and reptiles.

A wide variety of programs were available for adults as well. *Black Elk Speaks* was discussed during a Humanities book talk. Other Humanities programs included "Ruth Law Aviator," "Listening for Form in Jazz" and "I Doctored Myself as well As I Could." Talks were also presented on gardening at the Fells and antique buttons. Trick or treaters came to the library during the Center Halloween celebration and over 200 guests visited during our holiday open house. Knitters gathered around the fireplace on cold winter nights. The book discussion group met monthly.

Passes to the Planetarium, Shaker Village, The Fells, Strawberry Banke, the Museum of Fine Arts in Boston, and the newly reopened Currier Museum continued to be available to our patrons to allow them to visit for free or at a reduced rate. The brick memory garden has had donations for several more bricks and has still has room for anyone wishing to dedicate a brick to a loved one.

More staffing hours have allowed the library to deal with the increased activity and patronage over the past year. We were sorry to lose Amy Covell as a library employee but have added Mark Hampton and Rachel Baker to our staff. Katie Dunn is stepping down as a Trustee this year. We will miss her.
