Needing Help

Out of the depths I cry to you, O Lord; Lord, hear my voice! Psalm 130: 1 (NRSV)

Members of the New York City Fire Department will gather today at St. Patrick's Cathedral for a memorial mass remembering the 343 members of the department who died 20 years ago. I serve as one of FDNY's chaplains; today is a very sacred day among the people I serve.

Preparations for today's memorial mass began over a year ago. I was assigned the "Prayer for the Fallen" in the service, and as I prepared, words suddenly failed me. It was as if I didn't know how to talk to God on behalf of the people gathered.

How can I pray when the moment is so holy?

In desperation, I posted a request for help on social media. I needed words—original words, borrowed words, inspirational words, you-can-do-it words. Almost immediately, I started receiving prayers and songs and poems. They came as comments, direct messages, texts, and emails. And not just from my minister friends, but a rabbi, several firefighters, and multiple 9/11 widows. I needed help, and help came.

A friend from college wrote to me: "Often, we ask the Person Upstairs, but we're actually answered by the people next door or down the street, or even (gasp) on the internet. And that's maybe what the prayer could be about—we haven't stopped needing help, and we shouldn't stop asking for it. Because we know if we ask for strength to call out for help, help will come."

Today we remember that when we ask for help, God sends people. And on that Tuesday twenty years ago, people cried out for help. Many of the people who responded made the ultimate sacrifice and died that day. Others who responded became sick and died in the years that have followed. We honor their memory with our prayers—when we ask for help, accept help from others, and give help freely to others.



What is your alarm telling you?

SMOKE ALARMS

- A continued set of three loud beeps—beep, beep, beep—means smoke or fire. Get out, call 9-1-1, and stay out.
- A single "chirp" every 30 or 60 seconds means the battery is low and must be changed.
- All smoke alarms must be replaced after 10 years.
- Chirping that continues after the battery has been replaced means the alarm is at the end of its life and the unit must be replaced.

CARBON MONOXIDE (CO) ALARMS

- A continuous set of four loud beeps—beep, beep, beep, beep—means carbon monoxide is present in your home.
 Go outside, call 9-1-1 and stay out.
- A single chirp every 30 or 60 seconds means the battery is low and must be replaced.
- CO alarms also have "end of life" sounds that vary by manufacturer. This means it's time to get a new CO alarm.

 Chirping that continues after the battery has been replaced means the alarm is at the end of its life and the unit must be replaced.



Make sure your smoke and CO alarms meet the needs of everyone in your home, including those with sensory or physical disabilities.

Some tips:

- ✓ Install a bedside alert device that responds to the sound of the smoke and CO alarms. Use of a low frequency alarm can also wake a sleeping person with mild to severe hearing loss.
- Sleep with your mobility device, glasses, and phone close to your bed.
- Keep pathways like hallways lit with night lights and free from clutter to make sure everyone can get out safely.

Hear a Chirp, Make a Change!

A chirping alarm needs attention, Replace the batteries or the entire unit if it's over 10 years old, If you don't remember how old the unit is, replace it!

Get out and stay out! Call 9-1-1 from outside.

After gathering input at a public hearing on Aug. 25, the Cemetery Trustees voted to adopt revised Cemetery By-Laws and Regulations. The trustees strongly urge the residents of Canterbury to familiarize themselves with these bylaws and regulations (canterbury-nh.org), especially the requirement whereby all ornaments surrounding headstones, except U.S. flags and military stanchions, be removed by Nov. 1 in preparation for pre-winter maintenance.



Trail Notes: a pleasant trail experience awaits you in Loudon

Not all of the great local trails are in Canterbury. Recently the

Loudon Trails Sub Committee reached a significant milestone: We finally completed the first trail we started with four years ago. We'd completed the 2.6 miles of the two connected trail loops in Loudon's Bachelder Town Forest but never did the short connector to Kennev Road! Now you can start from Kenney Road or Young's Hill Road.

The west end of the trail starts from Young's Hill Road along a pleasant, level woods road beside a long marshy pond. There's shoreline access at the

north end - a good picnic spot. From Clough Hill Road take a left down hill onto Young's Hill Road just after the town garage and church/meeting house in Loudon Center. The parking area is on the left at the bottom of the hill just before the road crosses the neck of the pond. Trailhead is at the kiosk. You can make a return loop via a red connector or proceed on the blue blazed trail across the bridge over Bumfagon Brook. In less than a mile through open, interesting woods you'll come to the yellow blazed Kenney Road connector.

For the Kenney Road connector go up Lower Ridge Road to

Kenney Road right (just before Lower Ridge Road comes to its end). Before long you'll come to the bridge over Academy Brook. The Epps

Mills Trail starts on the right just before the bridge - a short trail past many impressive old mill sites. Parking is over the bridge on the right. Beyond the bridge the road is town maintained then very well resident maintained. Just after the road levels off from the hill there's parking on the left. From here on the road is easy walking

> soon after the connector goes right on an old and interesting road. The connector goes left from this road (not far) and is very shortly at the north end of the North Bachelder loop.

through nice old woods. At the last

house a ditch crosses the road and

I recommend going on as far as you want on Bachelder to leave time for the Epps Mills Trail – a spectacular chasm filled with very obvious remains of old mills. Total one-way Kenney Connector is .8 miles. Total one-way Bachelder loops are 1.3 miles or 2.6 with return loops.
