Bus Service in Canterbury! Check It Out!

Free, door-to-door service available for seniors, people with disabilities

A new door-to-door bus service for seniors aged 60 and over and those with disabilities is now available free of charge on Mondays and Tuesdays in Canterbury!

The service is provided by the Community Action Program of

To learn more, register or reserve a ride, here's the number to call: 603-225-1989 Belknap-Merrimack Counties, and it began running in Canterbury earlier this year. It's available between 8am and 3 pm on Mondays for residents on the east side of town and for the same hours on Tuesdays for residents on the west side of town. The bus will pick you up at your home, take

you to your medical appointment, grocery shopping, or a different errand, then bring you home. Each outing is limited to two stops, although exceptions are possible.

You can make a reservation for the bus by calling anytime up to 2:30pm on the previous day. Buses are handicappedaccessible, with wheelchair lifts, and the drivers are trained in passenger assistance.

Registering is easy. You'll simply need to provide your name, address, phone number, and an emergency contact.

On Mondays, the service is provided by Mid-State Transit, and on Tuesdays, by Concord Area Transit. That's because of different funding sources. The service itself is the same.

Got a distant medical appointment? In addition to the local

bus service, there's a volunteer driver program that can help get riders to medical appointments beyond the core service area such as Manchester, Lebanon, or Boston. You need to schedule that service between three and seven business days in advance of your appointment.

Want to become a volunteer driver? You need to be 21 or older, with a valid New Hampshire driver's license, auto insurance, and a dependable vehicle. Volunteers serve the area in which they live, set their own hours, decide how many trips they want to provide, and can opt in to receive mileage reimbursement.

CES students hit the road for field trips

CES students recently had the opportunity to visit the Canterbury Fire Department for Fire Safety Week. The students learned the importance of having a smoke detector and making sure that the batteries are changed at least twice a year.

Firefighter Katie Downs showed the students all of the necessary fire gear and then put it on and walked around so that each student could see it up close. Deputy Fire Marshall Mitch Cady then introduced his partner, Cy, an



accelerant-detecting yellow labrador retriever. The students really enjoyed learning about Cy. A special thank you to Chief Mike Gamache, Captain Craig Simpson, Lieutenant Dave Nelson, Firefighter Katie Downs, Firefighter Evan Hauptman, Firefighter Cameron Burns, Deputy Fire Marshall Mitch Cady and Cy for inviting our school to the fire department.

K-2 went on two field trips, the first to Hackleboro Orchard, where they picked apples and visited with some farm animals, and the second to Petals in the Pines! There the kindergarten experienced a live version of the story Peter Rabbit, first grade went on a story walk through the woods, and second grade learned about the life cycle and migration of monarch butterflies. This was the first field trip for many of our learners and it was a huge success! Thank you to Donna Miller and Harry Weiser for encouraging outdoor learning for our primary grades.

Students in grades 3-5 went on a field trip to the NH Audubon in Concord. The students chose between an autumn adventure hike or a pond discovery. The students who went on the hike learned about different species of trees and animals. Students flipped over logs to find salamanders, slugs and insects. The students who went to the pond learned about the different fish, insects and amphibians that live there.

Morrill Road bridge work done

The Board of Selectmen meetings will be held on Nov. 1 and 15. The Budget Committee will join the board on the 15th to review department heads' proposed budgets.

The bridge on Morrill Road was completed by M.A. Bean. This included removal of the existing culverts and the construction of concrete abutments and a new span. The work was done in just over two weeks.

Check your detectors for safety!

I would like to remind everyone to make certain that their smoke and carbon monoxide detectors are working. If you still have battery operated devices, fall is a good time to change out those batteries. In three out of five fire deaths nationwide there were no smoke detectors present.

Carbon monoxide, an odorless/tasteless gas, is a product of incomplete combustion. If you have any appliance that operates on propane, natural gas or oil, you should install a detector on every level of the home.

Do you need food? Call Sue (number above) to see if you qualify. The process is simple and if you have all your paperwork, you'll receive food the same day as your appointment.


