Greetings Canterbury Neighbors,

The Christmas Advent Season has begun once again as the snow begins to fly in New Hampshire. This month, we welcome the sights and sounds of the Canterbury holiday season: the lighting of the towering spruce tree in the Center, the myriad of simple flameless window candles in many of our homes dotting the landscape with brilliance in the darkest of night, the sound of holiday carols being sung at Shaker Village, and the list goes on.

At Canterbury United Community Church (as the weather outside can be frightful), we have begun meeting for worship in-person indoors again this past month, utilizing our sanctuary in combination with a live video projection to the Parish House as we do for a large memorial service in town. Using a combination of the two spaces in this manner has allowed us to maintain appropriate safe distancing and other measures to assure a reasonable level of safety for those who gather. We plan to continue such gatherings as we move through the advent season. We hope you will make plans to join us.

As we move quickly toward the beginning of a new year our pastoral search committee is excited to be interviewing candidates for the next settled minister to join us in 2022 and to be an integral part of this town. The congregation is committed to that position remaining full time, given our strong desire to serve not just the members of CUCC, but to also serve as a broader spiritual and practical support to the community as well. It is our prayer that our neighbors have and will continue to benefit from this ongoing commitment.

It's also become increasingly clear that an important part of that commitment depends on ensuring our church finances remain sustainable to assure a good foundation on which to welcome a vital contributing leader to Canterbury in the coming months. Shaker Village offers weekend merriment

Canterbury Shaker Village gets the holiday season off to a celebratory start with "Merry Merry Canterbury," two weekends of revelry to be presented Saturdays and Sundays, Dec. 11-12 and Dec. 18-19 from 1 to 5 pm. In addition, the village's treasured Candlelight Tours will return on Saturday and Sunday, Dec. 18-19, at 4 and 5 pm.

On both weekends, from 1 to 5 pm daily, visit the Horse Barn to ascend the "Stairway to the Clouds," where sights, sounds, and smells of the season will intoxicate the spirit. Downstairs in the Barn, the young—and young at heart—can indulge their creativity by making pomanders and cinnamon stick tree ornaments.

The weekend of Dec. 11-12 features "Absolutely Magic" with family-friendly magician Andrew Pinard in the Hubbard Gallery daily at 2 and 4 pm: Magician Andrew Pinard with his spellbinding, family-friendly magic show. At 5 pm daily, the Canterbury Singers will perform Shaker songs and holiday carols outside the horse barn.

The weekend of Dec. 18-19 features the world premiere of the *Birdie* Dance and Theater Performance in the Hubbard Gallery daily at 3 pm. Inspired by the Canterbury Shaker "Entertainments" of old, artist-in-residence Lorraine Chapman and six dancer/performers interpret the story of Alberta MacMillan Kirkpatrick, the last girl to be adopted by the Shakers. The candlelight tours will be offered daily at 4 and 5 pm, with tickets sold separately. These tours focus on how Shakers observed the season, capped off by a performance of "Simple Gifts."

Admission for "Merry Merry Canterbury" is free for youth; \$15 for members; \$20 for adults, and must be reserved in advance. The Candlelight Tours are a separate fee of \$50 per person, with limited capacity.


All tickets may be purchased online at shakers.org. The village requests that all visitors be fully vaccinated. Masks required.

Susan I. LeClair wing will honor the library's transformational director



Thinking of the Woods, Thinking of Others

Trail Notes: It can be just as important to let your mind wander

I often remember a reader of the hiking pieces telling me she was sure she'd never walk any of the trails but that she certainly enjoyed reading about them. I told her I thought mental walks were as valuable as physical walks. Where your mind wanders is as important as where your feet wander.

The wandering of our minds is more of a concern nowadays—too many places you'd just as soon not go. I count my blessings more frequently these days. Living in Canterbury, of course, makes this easier. As a country song puts it, "Those days when my gratitude exceeds my expectations I have very very good days."

Living in the midst of the abundance of nature we have here, my mind does not lack for paths to wander and nature to contemplate. Of course now that I'm 79, my physical wandering is curtailed. But my mental excursions into the natural world have become constant. For most of my life I hiked to get above treeline, for the wide open spaces, the views of surrounding peaks. Longer hikes where I could go from peak to peak, look back and see where I'd been, observe the changes in vegetation with altitude changes, camp in the back woods were best. Way back when we could camp on the summits.

Nowadays I have my favorite local walks, some of which I do often just to observe and discover the seasonal changes and recall them as I lie on the sofa. Speaking of the sofa, the other day I was lying there, my mind drifting, when I spied an eensy shining silvery dot moving up and down in the sunbeam. No, not a dust particle. It moved up and down like a very small slow yo-yo. It could only be a new hatched spider baby moving up and down on its invisible filament.

I spend much time on the sofa with books, filling my mind with the incredible variety and complexity of life forms surrounding us. Did you know there are over 350 kinds of ladybugs in North America? And "95 percent of all plants ... have access to nutrients and water they obtain through a relationship with fungi," from *Naturally Curious*, by Mary Holland. The mycelia are a greater volume of living matter beneath the ground than there is above it.

The complexity of the natural world is almost incomprehensible. To me, the "size" of the universe certainly is. I find the thought of being a speck immersed in nature uplifting, perhaps like what the Indians referred to as their "Great Spirit."



Waste Committee to seek baler, electrical system work

We hope to have a warrant article for the March Town Meeting requesting funds to upgrade the electrical system at the transfer station and purchase a large baler. There are two broad arguments for doing the upgrade. The first argument is for practical reasons. The second argument is for social responsibility. We'll address the practical reasons this month and the social responsibility reasons next month.

We are able to use the packer truck instead of an electric compactor mostly because we are so close to the Penacook incinerator. If the incinerator were to shut down and we had to ship longer distances, using the packer truck would not be a viable option. We would need to get an electric compactor which would require an upgrade to the electrical system.

Similarly if the packer truck, which is very old, were to cease to function it would either have to be replaced with an electric compactor (again requiring a system upgrade) or be

replaced with a newer, more expensive truck.

The recycling market is volatile and unpredictable. Right now we recycle our plastic using an old baler that produces bales smaller than normally sold on the market. We get away with it now but pay for it with lower revenue. Maybe someday we wouldn't even have that option. We could get a bigger baler to get more revenue or to recycle more types of plastic but not without an electrical system upgrade.

Right now we could get a much higher price for our cardboard if we baled it but that would require a bigger baler, which in turn would require an electrical system upgrade.

In short, our old electrical system is an impediment towards dealing with equipment failures, incinerator closures, recycling options and revenue enhancements.


