Thank you for your warm welcome to Canterbury! In these first few weeks, I've loved meeting new neighbors at church and at the store, the Whole Child Center, and the library and Canterbury Elementary School. Folks tell me how they're

longing for their favorite Canterbury gatherings: potluck dinners with friends, community meals in the Parish House, contra dances and concerts and of course, the Canterbury Fair. You've made it clear that this is a town where *people* are the main event.

Slowly, we're taking first steps into normal: carefully attending weddings and memorials, holding church services inside, hosting small birthday parties and classes upstairs in the Parish House wearing masks and staying distanced. We're all so hungry for before-times; our vivid memories kindle deep longing and a fog of exhaustion and impatience. And as the days lengthen

and the birds start calling earlier and earlier, our expectation and hope revive. It's hard *not* to hope here.

Slowly, inexorably spring appears and reminds us that renewal is real. With each sign, swelling buds, chipmunks slipping through rocks, the lion and the bear dancing across the night sky, we shed another piece of our winter protection. Spring comes by hints and nudges: a day of melting, a night of freezing, the mud softens then freezes in waves and gullies. We hope, even as spring snow flies; we know that winter's receding, but still we sleep under a pile of blankets. As we wait, we dream of planting, painting the house, paddling on still icy lakes. Spring wakes us slowly: thaw and freeze, longer light and persistent ice, biting wind and cardinals calling.

After a second year of pandemic fear and grief and loss, hope is rising, but not with lightning bolt or proclamation. We are rising out of this nightmare with our day-by-day care of one another: vaccination, masking, and staying distant, certainly, but also greeting one another, checking in, sharing a meal, helping with the shoveling. Still, we need to keep the stove going for now. Life and love call us to patience, planning, and dreaming. We have a lot of catching up to do: celebrations, memorials, fairs and rummage sales and parties, whole seasons of sports and music and theater. Some of us need work; many need company; many need healing, and all of us need beauty and adventure. No doubt, recovery will come with a step forward, a step back, with melting and freezing. But our inheritance is spring hope, so for now we delay our delights to protect those who are vulnerable: family, neighbors, and strangers so that, soon, we can smile at one another in the new spring light.

### Historical Society accepts donations, offers prints of Canterbury in days past

Significant donations were accepted into the Canterbury Historical Society Archive Collection by the trustees at their February meeting. Among the items were: T-shirts donated by Jesse Tischko from a Canterbury elementary school playground fundraiser; an early 20th century photograph of Olina (Johansson) Plastridge; various church records/items including an 1893 brochure from the Congregational Sabbath School Association; church council records from 1947 to 1957; Clough Bible; hymnals and family bibles; a brochure to bring people to church from the 1970s; and a watercolor of the Canterbury Country Store (when it had gas pumps) donated by Jean Richards.

### Tuesday, March 8: Town and School Ballot Voting

#### Voters to consider zoning amendments

There are three zoning amendments on the ballot this year. (Please note: We did not have space to include the actual language of the amendments, but you will find that language posted at the Town Hall on voting day. It is also available online on the town's website under Town Clerk-Tax Collector: canterbury-nh.org/town-clerktax-collector.)

**Article 2:** Are you in favor of the adoption of an amendment to the existing Canterbury Zoning Ordinance Article 19 Campgrounds as proposed by the Planning Board?

Ballot summary: This amendment is to open campgrounds to allow winter camping operation and emphasize that sites can only be used for temporary occupancy only. The amendment will remove the current operational requirement that campgrounds must be seasonal only, with an annual operation period that starts no earlier than March 21 and ends no later than November 15.

(The actual language of the change includes deletions and additions to the existing text. The changes were approved by the Canterbury Planning Board on Dec. 14.)

**Article 3:** Will the Town vote to expand the Center Historic District to include Tax Map/Lot #107/23, also known as 40 Kimball Pond Road, also known as the Kinter property, such that the following "metes and bounds" text is incorporated into the Center Historic District zone description in Article 13 of the Town Ordinance?

**Ballot summary:** The proposed change is requested by the property owners, the Kinters, and is supported by the Historic District Commission and Board of Selectmen and was approved by the Planning Board at the public hearing on December 28, 2021.

(The actual language of the change is a legal description of the property involved.)

**Article 4:** Are you in favor of the proposed amendment to Canterbury Zoning Ordinance Article 8.1.A?

**Ballot summary:** Canterbury's Variance Ordinance was adopted at a time when there was a distinction between "use variance" and an "area variance" and provided for both. Since then, the New Hampshire Legislature eliminated area variances and required that all variances follow the standard for use variances. This amendment makes Canterbury's ordinance comply with the state law and provides a single variance standard.

(The actual language, approved by the Planning Board on Jan. 25, replaces Section 8.1.A in the zoning ordinance.)



### Solid Waste Committee seeks upgrades at transfer station to support recycling

Over a decade ago a landfill was proposed along the Merrimack River in Canterbury. The town rallied against it with legal challenges. We also fought against it indirectly by implementing the Pay As You Throw program to enhance our already strong commitment to recycling. The idea was to reduce the need for landfills in the first place. Our story had a happy ending with the proposed landfill site becoming a Fish and Game preserve.

To our north lies the beautiful town of Dalton, which is now threatened with a landfill of its own. Tim Egan, a state rep from the nearby town of Sugar Hill, summed up the situation: "Right now, the mindset of the state is 'Oh we'll just put the trash up into the North Country and no one will care.' Well, people care. We live here. We work here. We raise our kids here." Just as Canterbury fought back over a decade ago, Dalton and the surrounding communities are fighting back now.

One town recycling more or recycling less is not going to change the outcome. For that we need strong federal and state policies and laws. But our recycling rate is the one thing we do have control over. It is the one tangible contribution that we as a town can make. We made the effort when our community was threatened over a decade ago. Let's continue to make the effort today now that Dalton is threatened.

The Solid Waste Committee asks for your support for the warrant article which will upgrade the electrical system at the transfer station and add a new baler so we can recycle more plastics, plus create future flexibility for other recycling and revenue opportunities. We look forward to the vote at Town Meeting on Friday, March 11.

The town's Hazard Mitigation Plan is being updated. The



update is required every 5 years.
Participants involved in the update include the staff at the Town Office, Fire Department, Highway Department, Police Department, Selectmen and the Central NH Planning Commission. The committee meetings are being held virtually and are open to the public. We will post the meeting dates and links on the town website. The meetings will

start sometime in late March.

The Hazard Mitigation Plan allows the town to receive federal funds in the event of a declared disaster and eligible for grant funds for mitigation projects.
