... weather. Still others retreat to family camps or cottages, and face all the upkeep that even summer places require!

It seems to me that this summer we are working as hard as ever —maybe even harder!

September and the start of school may bring some relief to those of us who aren't teachers or educators. But regular school hours bring their own pressures and work to our lives. Even with the relief of school schedules, we may need a change. We may need that ancient, radical practice: Rest.

Imagine that! Jewish and Christian tradition (in those Ten Commandments) call us to keep holy one day a week, the Sabbath. But even for faithful folks, that's asking a lot! What about one hour every other day, or 20 minutes a day doing just one thing, not several things at once? Consider 20 minutes a day when we turn down the noise and notifications, unplug, and —do just one thing (cue disaster music!). What if we choose to just listen to a neighbor or read a book or weed or walk or daydream? What if we choose to rest? Even though it will take some practice, we could all benefit from some dedicated leisure time, even our most active kids (of all ages)!

Maybe this year, we could mark Labor Day as a new beginning. What if, this year we honor our labor and the labor of others by engaging in a new habit of planned, regular rest? Though it may feel selfish or lazy or silly at first, give it some time; most of us have some work ethic deprogramming to do before we can feel at home with rest. Eventually we may find ourselves feeling rejuvenated and a little steadier, a little more clear-headed, and yes—even a little happier.

Broadband Project Update, Primary Voting Info

Comcast misses out on first round of funding

The selectmen continue to work with Comcast for expanded broadband coverage. The state approved grant funding of \$130 million. Of that, \$50 million was awarded in August to a single company. Unfortunately, Comcast was not the recipient. As Comcast already covers almost 80 percent of the town, it would seem difficult for a different company to provide services for the remaining "unserved" residences. The remaining \$80 million will be awarded this fall and hopefully the RFP will allow more than one company to be awarded the funds.

The Board of Selectmen met with the Budget Committee on Aug. 29 to review the budget. Expenses are at normal levels except for fuel for our town vehicles. With the cost of fuel doubled the budgets are either already expended or very close to being expended. The Department heads met with the Town Administrator and identified funds within their budgets that can be redirected to the fuel budget lines.

We received \$128,977 for the second payment of ARPA funding. We hope to use this for broadband expansion. The state also distributed a one-time extra payment of Highway Block Grant money, bringing the yeat's total to \$176,747.

Paving has been completed on sections of Baptist Hill Road and Shaker Road. The Selectmen will have their regular meetings on Sept. 12 and 19. The Town Offices will be closed on Sept. 5 for Labor Day.

State primary voting will be held Tuesday, Sept. 13, at the Old Town Hall, 1 Old Tilton Road. Polling hours will be from 7 am to 7 pm.

Sample ballots are posted on the Town Clerk's page on the website, canterbury-nh.org, and they are also available on the Secretary of State's website. The application for an absentee ballot is also on the website, but can be mailed to you upon request.

The last day to apply and receive an absentee ballot is Monday, Sept. 12. The Town Clerk's Office in the Sam Lake House, 10 Hackleboro Road, will be open from 3 pm to 5 pm for any last-minute absentee requests.

The Supervisors of the Checklist will be in session at the Sam Lake House from 7 pm to 7:30 pm on Thursday, Sept. 1, to make additions and corrections to the checklist. No changes of party will be accepted at this time.

Maple Grove Cemetery vandalized; police and trustees seek public's help

The Canterbury Cemetery Committee is saddened and disturbed to report that the Maple Grove Cemetery on Baptist Road was vandalized sometime during the period of Aug. 11-14. Veterans flags and plantings at gravesites were pulled up and trampled, and keepsakes were removed and scattered. Evidence indicates that the perpetrators committed these acts while riding an ATV. ATV's are never permitted in a Canterbury cemetery and desecration of a gravesite is a violation of state statute RSA 635:7.

We are asking for your help. If you observed anything that might lead us to the perpetrators, we ask that you contact one of the Cemetery Trustees or the Canterbury Police Department. Anonymous tips are welcomed. Thank you.

In June the Loudon Food Pantry gave out enough food to 243 individuals for them to prepare 6,278 meals. Of these people, 120 were age 60 and older (49 percent), 37 were age 18 or under (15 percent), and 86 were between those ages (25 percent).

In July the pantry gave out enough food to 293 individuals for them to prepare 4,553 meals. Of these people, 141 were age 60 and older (48 percent), 45 were age 18 or under (15 percent), and 107 were between those ages (37 percent).

Let's do it all again next year, maybe the Last Saturday in July?



New book group offers a place to be there for each other


