### Community Power initiative is taking shape!

# Bring your questions to public hearing set for Thursday, Dec. 15, in Parish House

Much has happened with Community Power in Canterbury since the last issue of the newsletter! The Canterbury Community Power Committee (CCPC) was formed with volunteer members appointed by the selectboard. A committee chair was elected and working groups formed to focus on specific goals.

A new CCPC page on the town website (canterbury-nh.org/canterbury-community-power-committee) will have meeting agendas, minutes, announcements and important information going forward.

Work continues on an Electric Aggregation Plan (EAP), which voters must approve at Town Meeting in March in order for Canterbury to participate in the electric power market as a member of the Community Power Coalition of New Hampshire.

Please mark your calendars for a public hearing on Thursday, Dec. 15, at 7 pm in the Parish House, when the CCPC will:

- Outline the benefits of and respond to questions about Community Power (CP):

- Summarize key provisions of the draft EAP and ask for your feedback; and
- Identify steps you can take *now*, before CP "launches," to reduce monthly electric bills.

Please look for our town-wide survey, available in digital form on the CCPC page on the town website and in paper copies at the Country Store and the Library. It will give us valuable feedback on residents' preferences and concerns about Community Power, and we will use it both to improve the Electric Aggregation Plan and to develop future communications and programs. We want community input as we move forward!

A series of Community Power FAQ's is being presented in the weekly town-wide email and will be posted on the CCPC page on the town website. If interested in Community Power, please also visit the Community Power Coalition of New Hampshire's web page at cpcnh.org.

### "If You're Cold, the Cows Must Be Cold Too!"

### Or are they?

We are often asked how we keep our dairy cows warm in the winter months. And the truth is, we don't have to do as much as you might think. Barns and livestock facilities of past generations were built to keep everything buttoned up tight and everything inside them warm. Today, we know that cows actually stay healthier if we keep the barns open to allow for plenty of fresh air flow.

Cows are extremely cold tolerant, provided they are dry and well fed. In fact, they are much happier most days in January than they are in July. Although hot weather can be tough on cows, research has shown that a dairy cow at a healthy weight with a winter coat will be content in the cold even when the temperature drops well below freezing. Their large bodies are efficient at holding in heat, and with stomachs that serve as large fermentation vats, they actually generate considerable heat just by digesting forage.

Of course, there are a few adjustments we need to make in the winter to keep everyone comfortable. Water sources need to be monitored closely to ensure they don't freeze over. Heavy plastic windbreaks are hung on the north sides of the barns to keep the draft down. Calves are given extra bedding. Snow and ice need to be kept clear from walkways to allow cattle safe access to stalls, feed and water. Extra feed is provided as needed, as cows tend to eat more in cold weather.

So, as winter quickly approaches, we humans certainly
