

Dear Friends.

Preoccupied after a recent visit at Concord Hospital, I was driving a little too fast toward home. I was thinking about the suffering I'd seen, the exhaustion and the courage, too. I always

feel deeply privileged when I'm invited to sit with individuals and families in these shadowy times. So often in the mess of healing and illness, something beautiful and deeply human rises up. So, I was speeding along when those graceful curves in Boyce Road shifted my foot to the brake. And then I came to a field of standing reeds, and one blackbird perched on top of a cattail. I slowed and pulled over. I opened the window.

On a dull field of dead reeds under a grey sky, that blackbird was trilling and chipping and flashing his colors. He was warning off competitors, I suppose, though I couldn't see any; or perhaps he was showing off for his beloved, wherever she was. And I, foolish human racing along in my tin can of a car, I was returned to the beautiful now of springtime.

This return is part of what so many April religious traditions and rituals bring. Christians remember life and sacrifice through Holy Week and Easter; Jews remember life and liberation during Passover; Muslims remember life and holiness through Ramadan and Laylat al-Qadr. It's no coincidence that these



Town, School Voting Results ~ and More Town News

Wintry weather on election day did not keep voters at home

Thank you to all who attended the two sessions of Town Meeting this year. The snowstorm on Tuesday the 14th didn't keep voters away. There were 287 ballots cast on the 14th and the town clerk received 100 absentee ballots. All the warrant articles passed at the second session on Friday, which was well attended. The results of both sessions are available on the town website, canterbury-nh.org.



We heard from Comcast that the second round of grants for statewide broadband expansion was awarded to Consolidated Communications. We had issued an RFP to them in August of 2021 but they didn't respond. There is a third round of grants coming up later in the spring and

we hope that the state will see fit to award the grants to more than one company. Please feel free to contact your state representatives to inquire about the grant process and why when there are multiple companies offering broadband for New Hampshire, the awards are only going to one company. It would make sense to spread the awards around to multiple companies in order to complete "last mile" connections of existing infrastructure.

We have been having technical problems with our GoToMeeting platform that we use for broadcasting committee and board meetings. We are working with our IT company to fix the problem. The meetings and links are always posted to the town website, and if GoToMeeting is not working we also post an announcement so that anyone interested in joining knows they need to attend in person.

Our Highway Department has been working hard to keep our dirt roads passable for all traffic during the mud season. Please let them know if there is a road that needs attention.



Food pantry provides for almost 6,000 meals

In February 2023 Loudon Food Pantry gave out enough food to 261 individuals for them to prepare 5,988 meals. Of these people, 142 were age 60 and older (54 percent), 48 were age 18 or under (18 percent), and 71 were between those ages (27 percent).

What is better to donate, food or funds? There is what is known as a Meal Conversion chart. When donating food, the formula is weight-divided by 1.2 = meals. When donating funds, the formula is dollars times 4 = meals. Here are a few examples: A donation weighing 1 pound of food provides 1 meal, and a donation of \$1 provides 4 meals. A donation of 5 pounds of food provides 4 meals, and a donation of \$5 provides for 20 meals. Finally, a donation of 10 pounds of food equates to 8 meals, and a donation of \$10 to 40 meals.

Food donations allow us to incorporate a needed variety in the diets of those we feed. Financial donations allow us to purchase needed items that we don't receive in food donations. We can also purchase items in larger quantities.



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Canterbury Historical Society receives Civil War history donation

A Civil War "dog tag" belonging to Henry W. McDaniel has been donated to the Canterbury Historical Society. McDaniel was listed in Lyford's *History of Canterbury* as having enlisted on Sept. 17, 1862. His tag identifies him as being attached to Company G of the 15th New Hampshire Regiment. The 15th New Hampshire Infantry was organized in Concord between Oct. 6-16, 1862, and mustered in for nine months' service under the command of Colonel John W. Kingman. The 15th New Hampshire Infantry mustered out of service Aug. 13, 1863, at Concord. The regiment lost a total of 161 men during service, with 27 enlisted men killed or mortally wounded while 134 enlisted men died of disease. The dog tag is a gift of Ms. Janice McLaughlin of Franklin, for which the society is most grateful. The society is working with Elkins Library to create an appropriate place to soon display this rare find and important addition to our Archive.

Archival volunteers needed: We are asking for volunteers to assist us in preparing Archive materials for entry into our computer system so that the resulting information can be made easily available to researchers, students and the public. Currently we are working on church records, old deeds, old houses and oral histories, but there are many other areas that also need work. Our Research Area is ready to welcome you whether you are available for a few hours a week or more (it's up to you). Please contact our archivist Sam Papps for information. He will coordinatie efforts and oversee training.
