From the Pastor

Greetings neighbors,

I write to you in the wake of our congregation's focus on Earth Day this past week, and on a glorious morning in Canterbury where it is truly evident that Spring has finally sprung here in New Hampshire! I also write to you in the midst of disheartening world and national news headlines relating to the climate crisis that present themselves as our regular dose of bitter pills to swallow.

As we seriously consider the daunting challenges present in our world it is certainly understandable to lose a sense of hope, and to feel that our faith-filled actions are no more than just a drop in the bucket. Of course there are a myriad of fronts on which to focus and take action, and on this spring day my heart continues to focus on our responsible care for the Earth the Creator has entrusted to our care. This morning I find God seems to be shouting to us a song of hope somehow still evident in the very creation itself—a song encouraging us not to lose heart.

Jennifer Halteman Schrock, leader of the Mennonite Creation Care Network, puts it like this: "Hope is imbedded in creation. It is evident in every sprouting seed, in every green leaf straining toward the sun; in the dependable rhythm of the seasons; even in the wood decomposing on a healthy forest floor."

Yes, indeed, hope is evident in the natural processes of creation itself that can easily be seen springing forth today, putting that hope into practice as the natural world unfolds around us. Today life is daring to push through, and carry forth, even in the face of the regular uncertainty of what may lie in store each day.

In the face of environmental degradation on our planet it is easy for us to feel cynical and hopeless. But hope isn't just an emotion, it is something we put into practice as nature does. We practice hope when we teach younger generations to care for the Earth. We practice hope when we support businesses and nonprofits that care for the Earth. We practice hope when we recognize and support flourishing ecosystems and healthy farming practices ... in short, when we take the steps we can together to care for the gift God has given us.

Canterbury is a place where creation's hope is more easily visible and accessible than perhaps in other corners of our world, so I invite you to take a longer look and be encouraged by the tenacious life and hope that can be experienced in our beautiful rolling landscapes. May we follow the faithful example of our natural world—carrying forth in hope, encouraged and emboldened to spread that hope here in our community and beyond.



Canterbury Plant Swap makes comeback!



The annual Canterbury Plant Swap is returning this May after taking a year off due to COVID. It will be held on Wednesday, May 5, from 6 to 7 pm. We'll meet on the grounds around the gazebo in the center to maintain some social distancing. Please wear a face mask during the swap. Bring your labeled, divided perennials and bulbs, or extra flower and vegetable seedlings you might have.

There is a new invasive to be concerned about that gets spread through plant swaps and sales. It's the Jumping Worm and, unlike other common earthworm species, they are not good for our soils. I'm aware of some gardeners in town who have them. You may have them and not know it, especially when digging plants in April and May. They aren't usually seen as adults this time of year but their eggs may be present.

So we ask that you bring any plants dug from your yard or garden using new best practices: **PLEASE BRING AS BARE ROOT.** After you dig your plants use a high-pressure setting on your hose and spray all the soil off. You can put them in a shallow tray or plastic bags with enough water to keep the roots from drying out. This swap is open to anyone in town no matter your level of gardening experience. If you're new to Canterbury it's a great way to pick up some plants to landscape your yard and meet your neighbors at the same time. There's always plenty to share so come even if you don't have much to bring.

Town Meeting set for Elementary School

As a reminder, the second session of Town Meeting is Saturday, May 1, at 10 am at Canterbury Elementary School.

Last year we spent almost \$5,000 for notices for "Public Hearings" for land use hearings. RSA 675:7 "Notice Requirements for Public Hearings" was amended to allow notice of public hearings for land use on municipal websites in lieu of publication in a newspaper of



general circulation, provided that the notice or a link appears prominently on the home page, that it meets the requirements for timely posting, and that it be posted in two other public areas.

In an effort to reduce expenses, the town will be posting notices of public hearings for the Planning Board, Zoning Board and Historic District Commission on the town website and at the Town Office, Elkins Library and Canterbury Country Store.

Haven't voted in a few years? Time to re-register!

New Hampshire law requires that the Supervisors of the Checklist verify the checklist every ten years. Any person on the checklist who has not voted in the past four years must reregister to remain on the checklist. The Supervisors are sending notice letters to these voters at the address the voter provided when registering.

The Supervisors of the Checklist for the Town of Canterbury will hold sessions for re-registering voters who have not voted since April 1, 2017, accepting applications for new voter registration, accepting requests for the correction of the checklist, and/or change of political party affiliation on:



The need for food is not declining. In the first quarter (January-March) of 2020 the Loudon Food Pantry gave out enough food to create 17,919 meals. In 2021 during that same time period, we gave out enough food to create 25,505 meals. This is an increase of 42 percent.
