
Cherishing Stillness in Advent

Firefighters respond to 2 fatal accidents

The Canterbury Fire Department operated at two major motor vehicle accidents in the past month on Interstate 93. Both events involved occupant fatalities. These high-speed accidents required the use of our auto extrication tools to free the occupants. Members had trained with these new tools this summer on donated vehicles and instructors that came in from other agencies. The new tools and the training did help us in accomplishing these difficult extrications in a safe and effective operation. I have much appreciation for the members from Canterbury Fire, Tilton/Northfield Fire and Penacook Rescue that worked these difficult incidents.

As the Holiday Season approaches, a few things to remember to keep your family safe.

Candles: More than half of December home decoration fires were started by candles, compared to one-third in January to November. The top three days for home candle fires were Christmas, New Year's Day, and New Year's Eve. Do not leave candles unattended and make certain that they are out before leaving a room or going to bed.

Holiday cooking: Cooking equipment was involved in 19% of home decoration fires. This can happen when a decoration is left on or too close to a stove or other cooking equipment.

Use pot holders and keep small children away from the stove to prevent burns. Keep a pot lid close by to cover a burning pan and maintain a fire extinguisher for the kitchen. As you start to set your personal goals for next year, consider joining a community organization that can help you develop new skills and abilities, give you an opportunity to give back, become part of a brotherhood/sisterhood, develop leadership and communications skills. Energy audits available from NHSaves

On Oct. 22, the Canterbury Energy Committee hosted an event called "Button Up" sponsored by NHSaves. NHSaves is composed of Eversource, Unitil, Liberty Utilities, and NH Electric Co-op. Topics covered included ways to improve home energy efficiencies in order to save both natural resources and money.

NHSaves provides rebates for Energy Star appliances and will provide a home energy audit for \$100 if your home needs energy efficiency improvements. You can test your home (you'll need to know how much heating fuel you used over the last 12 months) by visiting NHSaves.com. If your home is not energy efficient, the program will pay for 50% of eligible energy improvements up to \$4,000. If at least \$100 of the suggested improvements are made, the net cost of the audit is \$0.

Remember Town Ordinance #1 when shoveling!

The Members of the Police Department would like to wish everyone a very Merry Christmas and a Healthy and Happy New Year.

Please give yourself some extra time when traveling this holiday season, winter is unpredictable especially with the changing weather conditions. Also, please be cautious and aware of those walking along the roadway and vice-versa, to those walking along the roadway please be aware of the vehicles and let us not forget that wildlife is also out along the roadways.

The department would also like to remind everyone as the snow has finally arrived, Town Ordinance #1 takes effect: It shall be a violation of this ordinance to put, place, or store or cause to be put, placed, or stored snow or ice in or across any road in Canterbury during any private snow removal activities.

And State law also requires you to keep your car clear of snow so that it won't fly off your roof and hit the car behind you.

A reminder: To reach a police officer you need to call 228-1010 which is our 24-hour dispatch line. If it is an emergency, 911 is the best way. The 783-0433 number is for business such as requesting reports, pistol permits, or looking to leave a message for a particular officer by listening to the automated prompts.

Trail Notes

Lots has been going on in the **Bachelder Town Forest** on Youngs Hill Road over the last year and a half. The Loudon Trails Sub-Committee of the Loudon Conservation Committee has been building hiking trails off Youngs Hill Road. The trails are almost complete and consist of two loops connected by a bridge over Bumfagon Brook. The first loop is a shorter and easier 1.2-mile walk. The second loop that starts on the other side of the bridge is 1.55 miles, a little hillier and more of a workout, but passes through beautiful woods and by several vernal pools.

Last year a group of volunteers was assembled to research the possibilities of creating trails within Loudon. The Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission worked with our group to find an appropriate location for our first trail. Back in 1992, the Bachelder Town Forest, consisting of over 150 acres, was generously given to the Town by Albert Bachelder. This property was chosen as it is a beautiful piece of land with very interesting sites to see. Harry MacLauchlan has also generously allowed the use of a parcel of his property for parking and for the trail.

This project has been a community effort with many individuals

October Meal Numbers

In October we gave out enough food to create 5,774 meals to 498 individuals. 131 of those were age 60 and older, 162 were age 18 or under and 205 were in between those ages. Our numbers were lower because our stock was low.

LFP Challenge Cancelled, But We Have a Solution

Holding the LFP Challenge over the years have given us some insight into what is needed for us financially and for donations received. What we found is that receiving large amounts of food and funds during a three-month span does not help to sustain us throughout the year. Also, it is after the holidays and volunteers are in short order so processing the food and getting it onto our shelves take longer than we like. So, the challenge is not effective for us!

The solution: Just like any household or business, we need income (donations) on a monthly basis. For us, it means fixed monthly donations coming in. This allows us to work with a consistent budget to purchase food items that are not donated but needed and to keep the pantry running so we can continue to feed those in need.

On Dec. 15, we are proud to launch "The 12 Months of Giving." It costs us 50 cents per meal per person. So, a donation of \$20 helps to provide enough food for 40 meals. A recurring donation can be monthly, quarterly, etc. Any time frame helps us to feed those in need. As of Dec. 15, more information will be available at tinyurl.com/y8d96dvb. No donation is too small!


