Dear Friends,

We're at the point in winter when general weariness marks our faces. The seasonal tasks of frequent mornings of ice scraping and snow removal preface our travel to work. The simple chores of daily life take longer, and become somewhat more tedious. The marvel of the snow cloaked trees, shrubs and roads eases the hardship of winter work, but not always enough to ease our complaining spirits.

February is the longest month with the fewest days. For us in Canterbury, last winter, beginning about now, was a long season of saying goodbye to many in our community who died. It seemed that every week held news of a new death. And yet, it seemed to me that these sorrowful events prompted us to call upon the best in ourselves as we gathered around each other, consoling and remembering and loving. It made a remarkable impression on me in my earliest days here to watch how well you did this work.

It is perhaps trite to say, but life near and far gives us ample opportunity to bemoan the sad and tragic events of our common life. How we respond to them makes all the difference. Remembrance of love shared, appreciation of the wondrous life yet before us, and the possibility of unexpected joy, these are things that strengthen us for the days ahead.

When we are tempted to opt for easy answers to difficult issues, and especially when we are fearful and unthinking, it might be a good thing to ponder the blessings of the past and the present, and engage with gratitude this life, today, even as we scrape the car windshield.

Shaker Regional School District is now an SB2 District which changes the way the school budget is developed and adopted. The District Meeting, which will be held on February 8th at Belmont High School at 6:00 P.M., will be a Deliberative Session and budget warrants will be explained, discussed, debated, and possibly amended. Voting to accept or reject each warrant will take place on March 14th at Belmont High School. There will be no discussion or deliberation at that time, only voting. If the operating budget is voted down on the 14th, the school district will adopt the default budget, which is the 2016-2017 adjusted budget. This year there are three open school board seats, two in Belmont and one in Canterbury. Residents from both towns can vote for all open school board positions. The communities will also be voting on Shaker Regional Education Association's 2017-2020 teacher contract. There will be same day registration on March 14 and the polls will be open from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 P.M. More information about the 2017-2018 school district budget and the SB2 process can be found on our district web site www.shaker.k12.nh.us .

CANTERBURY POLICE DEPARTMENT

A few reminders as we continue into our winter months:

Road conditions change quickly this time of year, so please be aware of State and Local Highway vehicles in the roadways cleaning, sanding and/or plowing. Also, use extra caution entering intersections, stop signs, yields, etc. for growing snowbanks. Remember to keep your windshield washer reservoir full, check your wiper blades, and, when you're at the gas station, wipe the sand and salt off your head and tail lights, and clear your license plates of snow.

A couple of State Laws to keep in mind; State Law requires you to keep your car clear of snow. State Law requires you to move over for emergency vehicles. A reminder: Town Ordinance of plowing snow or ice in or across the road is still in effect.

Please keep informed and be prepared of pending snow and ice storms for possible power outages. Make sure you have extra batteries, nonperishable food, and water available in case of a power outage and, as always, if you have an emergency call, 9-1-1, Merrimack County Sheriff's Department Dispatch, 228-1010.

As we fall into February 2017, we would like to let you know that from December 16th, 2016, which was the last newsletter deadline through January 17th, 2017, which is the deadline for this article, your Canterbury Police Department answered 125 Calls For Service, responded to 1 Motor Vehicle Accident, issued 76 citations (which included warnings), conducted 12 investigations and arrested 10 individuals.

Knowles Pond Hike

Knowles Pond in Northfield is perfect for a one hour or more canoe or kayak, nearby - once part of Canterbury, of course, the "north fields" of Canterbury. It has nice, easy hiking or mountain biking trails - contiguous. I anticipate the trails will be broken out in winter - it's well loved. You can count on having company especially during nice weather and on weekends. It was once a reservoir for the Tilton water supply so there is no human encroachment surrounding it, just open woodland and mixed hard and softwood with some pretty big oaks. The trail accesses varied terrain, most pretty level, often pine duff. They can be accessed from the boat launch where there is a small dock and limited parking, or from the parking area off Rand Road.

We like starting at the Pine-Dale link which takes you back to the pond so you can walk beside the water and a good swimming area with sunning slabs. There is a connection from the boat launch. The trail follows the pond edge mostly until it turns away and up an interesting small, rocky eminence. You'll be following the Hickory Loop here, the outer loop, which rejoins the inner Hemlock Loop ending up at the right side of the parking area. You can follow a trail alongside Rand Road up to the start of the trails on the other side of the road.

It's about a 25-minute drive going up 132 from Canterbury Center. After passing Northfield Pines and the police station on the right, you go almost to the traffic light in Tilton where 132 meets Route 3, turn right before this, just after the library on the right - Elm Street.

Then turn left onto Bay Street (sign for Spaulding Youth Center. Bay Street curves left before too long and becomes Bay Hill Road. - Uphill, (good views North), then descends shortly to a 4 way stop sign four corners intersection. Go right here onto Knowles Pond Road. In less than a mile you'll see the Pond on your right and the boat launch and shortly thereafter go right on Rand Road and almost immediately come to the parking area on the right.

From Shaker Village go north on Shaker Road, eventually down Fellows Hill to the level (Elk farm on right) then turn left at four corners up South Road. South Road eventually goes downhill curving right, Just before it levels out and the brook crossing turn left uphill. (Twin Bridge Road, not marked, but a sign "No Through Trucking".) This road soon merges right into another Shaker Road. Before two miles start looking for Wethersfield Road on the right. (A small development of "McMansions.") Very soon Bay Hill Road goes left. There's a very small house on the corner. Go up the hill to the four corners, four-way stop sign and left onto Knowles Pond Road and then same as from Canterbury Center.

CANTERBURY VOTING RESIDENTS...PLEASE READ THE FOLLOWING VERY CAREFULLY.....

THERE IS A NEW PROCEDURE FOR THE SCHOOL BUDGET ADOPTION PROCESS.

Last year the Shaker Regional School District voted to adopt the SB2 budgeting process which changes how the school budget is reviewed by citizens and adopted. If you want to read about the SB2 process, please look online at RSA 40:13.

WHAT THIS MEANS TO YOU:

On Wednesday, February 8, 2017 at 6 PM at Belmont High School, "The First (Deliberative) Session will consist of explanation, discussion and debate of each of the following warrant articles, and will afford <u>voters who are present</u> the opportunity to propose, debate and adopt amendments to each warrant article, except those articles whose wording is prescribed by State law". If you are not present, you will not be part of the proposals or debates.

For complete details, please reference the yellow 2017 school district proposed budget booklet available at the Sam Lake House and Canterbury Country Store, starting on page 2.

After the February 8th deliberative session, the budget will be put to a <u>BALLOT VOTE</u>, Tuesday, March 14, 2017 from 7 AM to 7 PM. The school district voting will take place at Belmont High School. There will be no discussion or deliberation at that time, only voting on what was approved in the deliberative session.

<u>PLEASE NOTE:</u> The school district budget ballot vote is completely separate from <u>Canterbury Town Elections</u> which will take place on the same day in the Canterbury Town Hall from 7 AM to 7 PM.

Tuesday, March 14th - voting for Town Offices will take place in the Old Town Hall from 7 AM to 7 PM. **ALSO: Tuesday, March 14th** - budget ballot voting for the Shaker Regional School District will take place from 7 AM to 7 PM at Belmont High School. **Briday, March 17th** - Contentium, Town Meeting will be held at the Contentium, Elementary School. **Starting time is 7 PM**

Friday, March 17th - Canterbury Town Meeting will be held at the Canterbury Elementary School. Starting time is 7 PM.
