

FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Friends,

As we prepared for two of our children and their spouses to visit over Christmas, we needed to clear several bedrooms. The beds needed to be used for sleeping, not storage of various things. Our son Sam's bedroom still had a bed in it, but the room was transformed years ago to be my study. Books that were in convenient piles around my reading chair needed to return to the shelves. On the desk stacks of clippings, notes and files needed filing, or after careful reading, entered into the circular file of a large green plastic bag.

It was, of course, the careful reading part that slowed the work. The files recorded projects and writing covering about ten years since the desk was last cleared. Some relic finds were precious, things well worth keeping, telling stories I had forgotten. The most precious items showed correspondence between myself and others. One red file contained notes and poems shared between Twig, aka Elizabeth Orton Jones, aka "EOJ" and me.

One small envelope in this red file, simple addressed "Bill", enclosed a poem she wrote for me on New Year's Eve, December 31, 1985. Twig was 75. I was 37. During the fall, Twig and I lost two people close to us. A lovely woman, active in our congregation in Mason and close friend of Twig's, Barbara Polk, was killed in an auto accident on Labor Day. Then, two months later, on November 30, my father died of sudden cardiac death. That Advent season of four weeks leading to Christmas was profoundly different. Time had no feeling of its precision, that ability we usually have to know one day from another, giving us a sense for its passage. Or within a day, to feel "ah, it's lunchtime", was absent. Loss of one we love can do that to us.

So, as 2017 begins, leaving behind another year of momentous events both personal and cosmic, I offer you this gift.

Here's Twig's poem.

for Bill -- New Year's -- 1985-1986

As brothers meet with a quickened feeling,
so one year pauses to greet the next --
wordlessly -- the past one looking into
the eyes of the one to come, the unspoken
password understood: Growth! And the
threshold is today.

Soft the footsteps. Pure the air. God's
whisper here. God's joy. God's presence.
And in the pausing: Faith!

Peace be with you all.

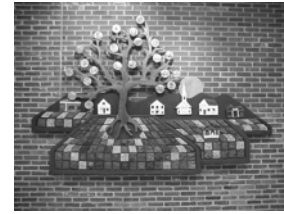

TOWN ADMINISTRATOR NEWS

The Staff at the Town Office and the Selectmen have been working with the budget committee on the 2017 budget and warrant articles. The next meeting is scheduled for January 23. The public hearing on the budget is scheduled for Feb. 6. The last day to accept petitioned warrant articles is Feb. 7th.

Art Hudson, Jan Stout, Mandy Irving, and I attended different seminars at the NH Municipal Conference in Nov.

Mandy, our town assessor, also completed a day long continuing education class on the updates of standards for appraisers that was taught by the United Standards of Professional Appraisers.

Another special Thank You to Brian Magoon, Gordon and Pam Jackson, Stephanie Jackson, and Art Hudson for replacing the lights on the tree in the center.

We have had a significant water leak in our municipal water supply line that services the Town buildings and the Parish House and Church. Our Highway department has completed some temporary repairs and will be working on the system again in the spring once warmer weather returns.

The new fire engine arrived in October. Dave Nelson and Chief Angwin worked to install radios, portable equipment and hose. Several training sessions were done and the engine is now in service.

FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS

It's that time of year when cold weather is upon us, so we need to get ready. Check your furnace filters, keep your dryer vents clean from lint, and check your heating devices to make sure they are clean and ready to go.

When setting up Christmas decorations, make sure to check for cracked extension cords or frayed wiring. Remember, never run extension cords or wiring under rugs or carpet.

I know I have mentioned checking your CO detectors and fire alarms many times. This is especially important when we get very cold weather and we crank up the heat to be more comfortable.

If you plan to travel for the Holidays, remember to fill your gas tank and use an additive in your gas because moisture can build up and cause the engine to run poorly or quit altogether. Also, keep in your car, a couple of blankets, some munchies, a flashlight and a folding shovel to keep your exhaust pipe clear, if you are stuck and must run the car to keep warm. One more thing. Our roads will narrow up with snow banks, so please drive safely and pull to the right when fire apparatus and emergency vehicles are approaching.

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WINTER HIKES

If there's a day when you don't have the time for a long hike, but want to get outside and enjoy an easy hike, check out The Pinnacle. The Pinnacle in Hooksett is worth the short drive south.
