# In Memory of Roy S. Hutchison

Roy passed away peacefully on Dec. 1, 2018. He was 88 years old.

In 1959 Roy and his brother Ken bought a 220-acre farm here in Canterbury where they raised apples and made maple syrup. In 1967 he and his brother divided the farm. Roy continued to raise apples and syrup. In 1967, he became co-owner of Hazen Printing in Penacook for 20 years. After selling the print shop in 1987 he did carpenter work for 30 years and continued making maple syrup.

Roy became involved in the NH Maple Producers Association in 1967, serving in all capacities. He managed the NH Maple booth at the "Big E" for a number of years. In 1984 he became a delegate to the North American Maple Syrup Council and in 1990 became the editor and publisher of the Maple Syrup Digest, a position he held for 24 years.

In 1999 he was selected to represent the NH Maple Producers at the Smithsonian Folk Life Festival in Washington, D.C. He and a friend, along with Roy's son, Brian, built a post and beam Sugar House from timber on his property, which was erected on the Mall. The building now finds a home at the Hopkinton Fair grounds as a permanent building.

He was elected to the Maple Hall of Fame in Crogan, N.Y., in 2003 and in 2010 received the Lynn Reynolds Leadership award from the International Maple Syrup Institute.

Roy was a Boy Scout leader and planned a number of adventures for his troop, including hiking, fishing and canoeing. He enjoyed many travels to maple meetings, throughout the States and Canada and especially loved the five summers spent in Alaska fishing, hiking and exploring. He loved fishing and hunting with his sons, brothers and nephews.

He was predeceased by his parents and his brother William, a son Wayne and his daughter, Lois Peters. He is survived by his Canterbury family, Mary Ellen MacCoy, Brian, Adrienne, Ethan, Jessica and Aurora Hutchinson, a step-daughter, Dana MacCoy Bishop, Chris Bishop and Quentin MacCoy, a son Ralph from Berlin, a step-son Eric and Elliott of Fairbanks, Alaska, and many nieces and nephews.

Roy could read the woods better than I could. The one time we were lost it just improved the outing. We ended up where the no-longer-existing trail was supposed to lead us.

Devil's Hopyard. Like no other place in the Mountains.

Wild River Valley. Roy knew we were going to have brookies for lunch. We cut poles for our lines and turned over rocks for bugs for our hooks. I caught the first one. Roy immediately appropriated a brightly colored fin for his hook. Right out of the stream into the frying pan.

Ridge "running" in the Presdentials when the kids weren't exactly running and the weather was deteriorating. Roy got 'em moving. Those boys remember.

Of course Roy's boys have more memories. Brian told me Roy had taken them camping and fishing up Wild River at an early age. No wonder he knew we'd want to stop there!

Brian reminded me of Roy's and my differing styles with the boys. They loved scrambling around cliff edges. I made sure to stay far enough away so I couldn't see what they were doing. Roy, however, just told them in no uncertain terms to stay the

## Two structure fires in a week keep Fire Department busy

The department responded to two building fires within a week so far in December. The first fire destroyed an outside storage building containing the season's supply of cordwood. The building was adjacent to an outdoor wood boiler that was also damaged by the fire. Lesson learned from this event is that with little or no snow cover, the dry leaves and grass will ignite readily with an ember even when the ground is frozen.

The second fire was located on Robin Shore Drive and occurred during the night, destroying a mobile home and additions. The fire had already consumed a significant portion of the structure before being reported to the department. Our mutual aid partners from Belmont, Loudon, Tilton/Northfield and Chichester all operated at the scene while Gilmanston Fire Department provided station coverage. The well-below freezing temperatures, the collapsed structure, and distant water supply all contributed to the difficulties in extinguishing this fire. While members worked this scene for over seven hours there were no firefighter injuries. Fortunately, with no resident at home during the fire, there were no civilian injuries.

I have great appreciation for our department members and the members from the surrounding departments that assisted us at the scene to bring this to a safe conclusion.



The department retired from service our 1957 International Forestry Tanker. Members had obtained the vehicle from a Federal Surplus Property Program on loan. They completed significant work on the vehicle converting it from its prior military use to firefighting use. Members spent many hours fabricating the water tank and pump and protective rails on the vehicle so that it could be taken off road into the woods to suppress fires. Much appreciation to the former members for their work on this vehicle and their service to the firefighting community.

## Please remember to drive like it's winter!

Road conditions change quickly this time of year, so please be aware of State and Local Highway vehicles in the roadways cleaning, sanding and/or plowing. Also use extra caution entering intersections, stop signs, yields, etc. for growing snowbanks. Remember to keep your windshield washer reservoir full, check your wiper blades, and when you're at the gas station wipe the sand and salt off your head and tail lights and clear your license plates of snow.

Speaking of changing conditions – everyone knows that it has been very cold, however cold temperatures do not mean that ponds and lakes have frozen over. So please before you venture out onto any frozen pond or lake whether to ice fish, snowmobile, ski or snowshoe, play it safe: There should be a minimum of 6 inches of hard ice before individual foot travel, and 8 to 10 inches of hard ice for snow machine or All-Terrain Vehicle travel.

Please keep informed and be prepared of pending snow and ice storms for possible power outages. Make sure you have extra batteries, nonperishable food, and water available in case and as always if you have an emergency call 911 or Merrimack County Sheriff's Department Dispatch, 228-1010.

For officer safety and yours, if you are involved in a motor vehicle stop by a police officer in the state of New Hampshire, please remain in your vehicle at all times, unless instructed to do differently by the officer who stopped you.

## Dam Project at Shaker Village

Informational meeting: Thursday, Jan. 17, 7 pm, Village Education Center (former Visitor Center)

Canterbury Shaker Village invites town residents to an informational session on the mandated replacement of the dam at Turning Mill Pond. The Pond is part of the historic mill system at the Village. It is an important feature of the Village landscape, is a conservation resource for the community, and supplies water for fighting fires at the Village and throughout East Canterbury.

After a breach in the dam, the state Dam Bureau mandated its replacement. The Village has two years to accomplish this task. The project estimate is \$200,000 and the Village has raised \$123,000 of that amount. We are continuing to seek funding from all possible sources, and would like to explore the possibility of some funding from the Town of Canterbury.

## Key Meetings on School Budget!

As an SB2 District, the Shaker Regional 2019-2020 budget adoption process will include the following. There will be two public hearings in January. The details of the proposed budget will be explained and the public may ask questions or provide input at these meetings. The first meeting will take place at Canterbury Elementary School on Jan. 7 and the second meeting will be held at Belmont Middle School on Jan. 9. Both meetings will begin at 6 pm. A deliberative session will be held on Feb. 6 at Belmont High School beginning at 6 pm. All warrant articles will be considered at this session. There will be opportunities for explanation, discussion, and amendment of each article. The conclusion of each article will result in voting either to add the article to the ballot for voting on Election Day in its original form, or to add the article to the ballot for voting as amended. When the deliberative session is adjourned, the language of each article will be finalized, but there will be no decision on whether or not it is passed. On Election Day, March 12, voters will mark "yes" or "no" on each warrant article in the voting booths with the outcome of each article being decided.
