FROM THE PASTOR

When Karen and I lived in Dover, NH in the early 1970's we were active at First Parish Church. The pastor, Art Domingue, preached extemporaneously every week. It was years before I attended theological school, but I liked his way of speaking, and I thought if I ever worked in a job, self to familiarity between listeners and the speaker. It enables the speaker to register the impact of the spoken word as the listeners' expressions vary. Smiles and frowns are evident. Excitement and boredom can be read clearly. Glazed eyes can be noticed before the stage of snoring is reached. Affection between speaker and listeners prompts respect. Practicing affection mindfully enables patience, forgiveness, and humility, features that are necessary for community life to be sustained.

Art once said that the sermon needs to be part of the ongoing conversation with the community during the rest of the week. Since I began working in Canterbury in September, 2012 I have received more active responses to my sermons than in any other time in 36 years of parish ministry. You have engaged me in many ongoing conversations. And, many of you have shared with me copies of essays and books that relate to subjects we discuss. Stacks of these adorn my study at home.

While pondering a writing task several days ago, I remembered a copy of an essay by farmer, poet, essayist, novelist and environmentalist, Wendell Berry, given to me in the fall of 2012. "It All Turns on Affection". I needed to return to that essay, but I had forgotten where I'd put it (a careful place, no doubt). Fortunately, memory served me well, and I found the essay within a couple of minutes.

Affection is the ingredient that holds families and communities together, sustaining them. Berry says that this is the most important part of what it means to be human, and without it we are wandering, mobile seekers after one stimulating and distracting thing after another. If done to excess, Berry says doing it at all, we give affection to things which destroy, and this is wrong. Berry says that the word "affection and the terms of value that cluster around it – love, care, sympathy, mercy, forbearance, respect, reverence – have histories and meanings that raise the issue of worth. We should give our affection to things that are true, just, and beautiful."

Affection is given and received, we learn how, in small communities that are sustainable. To be sustainable we need to honor two cycles, the fertility cycle of birth, growth, maturity and death, in harmony with a cultural cycle. The cultural cycle is an unending conversation between old people and young people. "The fertility cycle turns by the law of nature. The cultural cycle turns on affection."

As we feel ourselves stretched too thin by our schedules, full of many things that are essentially good, but straining every day the weave of affection in our families by the sheer weight of them, I wonder if we are indeed doing violence to ourselves, having lost the art of continuous conversation between people of all ages.

I invite you to join us for this conversation at Canterbury United Community Church, or by other means in our community, at nightly supper tables, and in the center of town gathering places. This is not an issue for church people only. If we care at all for the life of this community, this small and intimate gem of humaneness, then this conversation requires our attention, our affection.

In the last newsletter, I was happy to report that we had found and repaired the water leak in our water line. Well, bad news, we developed another more substantial (14,000 gals. in two days) leak. Good news, we found it the following week. The leak was in the line going into the Town Hall. We have shut the water off to the Town Hall until repairs can be made in the spring.

The town report is complete and should be available soon. Thank you to everyone that got the reports in and to the staff here at the Town Office that worked on it and to the Historical Society for the cover design and historical essay.

CANTERBURY POLICE DEPARTMENT

As winter fades into the background and better weather is just around the corner.... Well maybe, the weather still can be unpredictable so keep in mind a few more safety tips: Winter takes a toll on your vehicle so getting a tune-up is a good idea. You might need an oil-change, new filters, or brake inspection. Check your tire pressure. Harsh winter weather can deflate your tires. (A bonus; proper tire pressure can help increase your mpg). Check your lights; headlights, taillights, back up lights, turn signals, parking lights, brake lights and license plate lights. Also, a thorough cleaning to get the salt off your vehicle, especially underneath. When you're at the gas station, wipe the sand and salt off your head and tail lights and clear your license plates of snow. Don't forget to use those fog lights, especially during the early morning hours. As the weather gets warmer, the animals start moving, which means more animals are crossing roadways. The most active time is at dawn and dusk.

Keep your eyes peeled for bad road conditions. Remember, winter weather brings frost heaves, potholes and other driving obstacles. Rainy days can bring slippery road conditions, big puddles and flooding. Spring thaw can create deceptively deep areas. When driving through standing water, slow down and keep a steady speed. After you get back on dry surface, check your brakes by pumping them a few times.

Water can reduce braking efficiency until the brakes dry off. Also, driving slowly through standing water helps prevents splashing onto other vehicles and an unwanted shower to pedestrians and bikers! Be careful that standing water isn't ice, especially if temperatures are hovering around freezing. Also, please be aware of State and Local Highway vehicles in the roadways cleaning, sanding and/or plowing. A reminder, Town Ordinance of plowing snow or ice in or across the road is still in effect. Weight limits will soon be posted on the roads.

As we step into March 2017, we would like to let you know that from January 16th, 2017, which was the last newsletter deadline through February 16th, 2017, which is the deadline for this article, your Canterbury Police Department has answered 123 Calls For Service, responded to 1 Motor Vehicle Accident, issued 90 citations (which includes warnings), conducted 12 investigations and have arrested 7 individuals.

Remember: It's Time to Spring Ahead - Daylight Savings Time, March 12th 2017. As always, if you have an emergency call 9-1-1, Merrimack County Sheriff's Department Dispatch, 228-1010.

Canterbury Police Department will be hosting a blood drive again this year. It will be at the Elementary School on April 4th, from 2:30 pm to 7:30 pm. We're hoping for 25 units or more. Hope to see everyone there.

Hike Canterbury March 2017

I walk in the woods because I need the exercise, but also to get my "woods fix." This time of year, I can often get this from animal tracks. I've seen weasel tracks this year. Don't remember ever having seen them before. And rabbit – one. Hadn't seen any for years. Apparently, there are more of them up north.

Best is when animals tell their stories with their trails. One of my favorites was following a fox trail that went right over a stump. I could visualize the fox jumping up on the stump just for the fun of it.

Otter tracks can tell you about the fun they've had. I once followed an otter's tracks from the brook in the valley all the way up to Shaker Road. The otter had made the trip just so it could slide all the way back down on the crust perfectly dusted with snow. They also come up the brook to slide back down it on the sections of ice.

I once saw a deer and a bobcat's tracks intersect. At the intersection, there were several clumps of deer hair on the trail.

Our free-flowing brook often provides a good show of different ice forms including ones that resemble the pom poms on Mexican sombreros. At one spot, there's a small waterfall which is sometimes flowing under its ice. One year there was a small geyser where the water came out from under the ice. Every few minutes it would shoot up two or three feet.

I could go on and on. Being a wood guy I'm constantly checking out the trees. Being an old guy though, I have to spend too much time checking where my feet are going. Snow shoeing relieves this somewhat.

The Spring brings the endless show of regeneration, the Fall it's colors. I love seeing moss and mushrooms reminding me how much more life is going on beneath the surface of the soil than above it. I love lichen and glacial erratics. We have one as big as a small cabin! (Not on our trails – special guided tour required.)

It's forever possible to go over the same trails and see things you've never seen before.


