And connections like that -- connections with others in our community, and the warmth that comes with them -- are what bring me to the Canterbury church on Sundays. It's an opportunity to listen, to reflect, to sing -- the music is special -- and most of all, to spend time in the company of neighbors, young and old, big and small.

If you come to the Canterbury church, you know that already. If you haven't been yet, you'd be welcomed.

## Canterbury Excursion – Wetlands and Wildflowers at Hutchins Forest

Tuesday, May 9, 6:00-7:30 pm

The 108-acre Mary and Quentin Hutchins Forest is owned by the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests and is maintained for recreational purposes. There are a couple of loop trails that meander through a mixed pine and hardwood forest and cross over Burnham Brook. The forest and wetlands provide a diversity of habitat and a place for a gentle walk at the end of the day.

#### **Battis Crossing Road Hike**

We checked out the Battis Crossing Trails—actually woods roads. Going North on Intervale Road, once you come out the top of the gulley and the road levels off, Battis Crossing Road goes right almost at once. There's a turnaround at the end of the maintained portion, the old road continues straight. It's not immediately obvious, but easy to find.

The road goes through what looks to me to be grown up open space—scrabbly mixed open growth—blueberry barrens? It connects with well used woods roads, ATVs? Logging? We saw no sign of logging but the most used road has pink double ties down it. This road goes south and was somewhat muddy.

We took a west bound road which crosses the power lines and went into tall white pine woods. It followed along a ridge between 2 gullies, then descended quickly to the intersecting gullies with no obvious trail beyond. The gullies, some narrow, dark and deep, the one across the power line, wide and expansive, the most unusual feature of this area.

We followed another road south east to signs "No ATVs permitted." Level, soft roads, they'd be good for easy mountain biking. The power line would be best for fat tire. It has good views up and down and wooden poles. It's a very sandy area thanks to glacial Lake Merrimack.

The interstate can barely be heard once you get to the power lines. We got in an hour of pleasant, easy walking.

Battis himself was quite interesting. Sampson Battis was the first black resident of Canterbury. Born c. 1750, he enlisted for the Revolutionary War in 1776. He married a woman from Boscawen who had been a slave and they had many descendents. His grave is marked by a headstone in the Center Cemetery.

#### What is the Canterbury Fund?

The Canterbury Fund is a charitable trust established by Alexander Standish of Canterbury on June 10, 1966. The purpose of the Fund is to aid, financially, those Canterbury, NH residents who are in need of financial assistance due to the destruction of their homes or other hardships resulting from accident, or who have endured poor health of any member of the immediate family, or who need special education or treatment as a result of physical or mental handicaps of any member of the immediate family, or who are worthy students needing assistance for higher education. This aid is to be provided in the form of non-interest bearing cash loans without specific maturity. These loans to individuals are kept confidential.

In addition, the Fund may make grants to organizations in Canterbury to assist in the funding of community projects which, in the opinion of the trustees, are in the best interest of all Canterbury residents. As stipulated by Mr. Standish, the trustees of the fund are the trustees of the Canterbury United Community Church.

The trust also established a Canterbury Fund Loan and Grant Committee. This committee receives all requests to the fund for loans or grants. The committee makes recommendations to the trustees, who may approve or disapprove the recommendation of the committee. The Loan and Grant Committee is made up of the following organizations: the PTO, the Volunteer Fire Dept., the Ladies Benevolent Society, and the Trustees of the Elkins Fund.

Over the last 46 years since the fund was established, the fund has grown both through interest on the principal and proceeds from the Town Fair. The Fair was started by the CUCC, and is now a town-wide endeavor presently chaired by Lisa Carlson. Her phone is 1783-0335 and she always has great volunteer opportunities for those who want to help. Canterbury has seen many changes since 1996. The Trust document allows the trustees of the fund some latitude in updating procedures. The trustees are always interested in your thoughts.

The Loan & Grant Committee of the Canterbury Fund will be accepting applications only up till June 15th, 2017 for college assistance. Applications can be made through Ron Turcotte. Trustee. at 620-3717.
