"The Grand Resort Hotels of the White Mountains: Architecture, History, and the Preservation Record."

Architectural historian Bryant Tolles Jr. will share the history and architecture of the grand resort hotel phenomenon and hospitality tourism in the White Mountains of New Hampshire from the pre-Civil War era to the present.

The primary focus is on the surviving grand resort hotels: The Mount Washington Resort, the Mountain View Grand, the Balsams, the Eagle Mountain House and Wentworth Hall and Cottages. Extensive illustrations document these buildings and others no longer in existence.

New IT provider helps update computers

The town office has changed information technology providers. We now contract with Cybertron Technology Solutions out of Gilford. They provide IT services to several local municipalities and come highly recommended. We had to update our Firewall to meet the state DMV specifications and have installed offsite backup for our server for the town office. We are also updating all our PC's to Windows 10 operating systems and replacing two old PC's.

Larry Martin, who operates Martin Electric and Controls here in Canterbury, has installed a temperature and humidity sensor in the conference room as well as a water sensor in the basement at the Town Office. Larry did this work at no cost to the town.

Fire Department asks: Mind your mulch!

As we progress into Spring and continue with yard clean-up and gardening many people will apply mulch around their homes. While this product helps control weeds and beautify your property it is not without some problems. We have had problems with this material igniting and it will occasionally spread to a structure. Some tips from the State Fire Marshal's Office in how to safely use this product:



- Regulations prohibit the new application of mulch within 18" around combustible exteriors of buildings, such as wood or vinyl, but not brick or concrete.
- Use non-combustible mulch such as rock or pea stone around gas meters and combustible portions (wood, vinyl) of your home.
- If you smoke, remember to properly extinguish and dispose of all smoking materials. Always use appropriate receptacles for disposing of smoking materials and matches
- Do not discard cigarettes in mulch or potted plants.
- Be smart in your choice of containers for discarded cigarettes. Consider using metal cans with sand outdoors.
- Mulch that is piled more than a few inches high can build up heat and spontaneously catch fire.
- In many mulch fires, the smoldering mulch tunnels under the surface and then breaks out into open flame.
- Mulch fires start more readily when the weather is hot, and it has been dry for an extended time.

Free exercise classes continue at Parish Hall

Loudon Food Pantry

In March we gave out enough food to create 4,316 meals to 371 individuals. 111 of those were age 60 and older, 110 were age 18 or under and 150 were in between those ages.

Also, 1,866 meals (43%) went to Loudon; 1,124 (26%) went to Belmont; 675 (16%) to Canterbury; 582 (13%) to Epsom; and 69 (2%) to Chichester. The people we feed from Epsom were grandfathered in when Epsom opened their own pantry. We have not accepted any new Epsom people since.

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Trail Notes: A good read brings ghosts of old hikes to mind

I recently finished reading *The Sun is a Compass* by Caroline Van Hemet, a new book at the library. I think it's my favorite wilderness adventure story. I've read a few. A young couple paddles, hikes, skis, climbs through 4,000 miles of Canadian and Alaskan wilderness. Needless to say they experience extreme fear from time to time: a bear which shows a high level of interest in eating them, near drownings, etc.

It made me think of my own experience of fear in relation to backpacking, especially as I needed to write this piece.

In my limited mountain biking experience I found fear of falling added spice to the activity. Not so with hiking. I make a special point to avoid danger. It's not always possible. Hence some memories:

I'm a weather forecast junkie, but as we all know, they're not always accurate. You plan to arrive at a cozy cabin before the storm does. It comes early – lashing wind driven rain, thrashing trees that seem to be about to blow over on you. A feeble headlamp with a fading battery. Will you even be able to find the cozy camp? When we finally reached the cabin my hiking friend, Ben, got sewing machine leg and collapsed into his sleeping bag. I got to eat both our dinners, and we got a good ghost story too. (There really are quite a few ghosts in the Whites.)

Now I look for multi-day forecasts of good weather before heading out. Yes, some of the best weather comes right after a major storm. Ben and I were rewarded and the next day dawned spectacular. As we climbed above treeline in the southern Presidentials we could see the crosses along the trails shining in the sun. Each indicated a fatality. They shone with ice that had built out into the wind the night before.

Thus a ghost story.

Another even more frightening incident occurred hiking after a rain. It was gradually clearing but the trail and rocks were still wet. Anne and I and our kids headed up through King Ravine. The floor of King Ravine has the largest jumble of house- and garage-sized boulders I've ever had to hike over. They were slippery wet. It was a long way down between them. Whew!

But as we were climbing up the side of the ravine on Chemindes-Dames trail, after this ordeal, we were treated to the best peek-a-boo views ever. The wind was stripping away the fog, lifting and lowering the curtain on glimpses of the peaks above and the surrounding walls of the ravine.

Once we were out of the ravine we took the easiest trail back down.
