## Getting Energized About Electric Cars ... and More!



#### Did You Miss the Electric Car Show and Tell?

In September, the **Canterbury Energy Committee** sponsored a car show where eight Canterbury neighbors displayed their electric cars in the Center. Folks from Canterbury and beyond came to see cars that run all on electric and gas/electric hybrid cars. There were cars from Tesla, Hyundai, Subaru, Ford, Toyota and more. The best part was talking with our neighbors who drive these cars and learning what they like and what they don't like about their cars.

Did you miss it? You can still learn more about the electric cars owned by your neighbors. The best way to learn about electric cars is from someone who drives one every day!

#### What's driving that high electric bill?

Do you know how much energy your vacuum cleaner uses? They say microwaves don't use much energy, but how much do they use? The Energy Committee can help you with these curiosities!

We have a Kill-o-Watt Meter to lend to folks in town. It is a simple device that plugs into your wall outlet and you can plug in any regular electric cord into it to learn how much energy any electrical item uses. Understanding how much energy your electrical appliances and devices use is a great way to plan the steps needed to increase your energy efficiency and reduce your electric bill.

#### Fire Department focuses on prevention

As we celebrated National Fire Prevention week last month, through a coordinated effort between the fire department and the local elementary school we were able to bring all the children to the fire station.

Though the fire prevention theme this year is stovetop safety, we discussed what the children can do if a fire ever occurs in their home. We discussed knowing two ways out of their bedroom, and how to stop, drop and roll if their clothing ever catches fire. In addition, we discussed how they should work with other family members to designate a predetermined meeting place near their home if they had to escape a fire.

At Canterbury Fire Department we are committed to the fact that the best way to stay safe from a fire is to prevent a fire from occurring in the first place. We ask that you check both your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors to assure that they are in working order.

## The method behind the mowing program at Fife Conservation Area

The Conservation Commission maintains the Robert S. Fife Conservation Area along Kimball Pond Road for wildlife, to keep the view open, and to make the area available for people to enjoy. We mow half the field annually (the south half this year) to maintain the field habitat, which is a very important but declining habitat for birds and small animals.

By allowing half the field to grow for two years, we're increasing the variety of habitat. Animal watchers in town have noticed more animal activity in the field since we started with this mowing plan. Mowing only half helps keep the cost down too!

We also cut down the tall clump of poplars that had grown to obscure the view, pulled bittersweet out of trees along the edge of the field and are cutting down brush along the stone wall on Kimball Pond Road. In September we reconditioned the causeway at the north end of the field. The causeway allows tractors to cross to the west side of the field without damaging the wetland that runs north-south through the field, and provides a base for the SnoShaker's trail.

The Conservation Commission meets on the second Monday of the month at 7 pm, and everyone is welcome. We also have some open positions on the commission, so please let us know if you're interested in joining.

After exploring the village, take a walk down to the Turning Mill Pond Trail, where you will see the Pump Mill, built in 1905, the recently restored Turning Mill Pond Dam. On the west side of Shaker Road, located behind the parking lot, find Meadow Pond Trail, which offers 1.7 miles of beautifully wooded paths.

A Magical Winter Journey: This holiday season, Canterbury Shaker Village will be hosting A Magical Winter Journey from Dec. 9 to Dec. 20. The event will take place Wednesdays through Fridays from 2 to 5 pm, and Saturdays and Sundays from 12 to 5 pm in the Village's North Shop.

Your Magical Winter Journey begins as you enter the "magic wardrobe" and wind your way through our North Shop Barn which will be transformed into a wintery adventure. Artist-created vignettes will include a snowy electric train display, a Shaker Christmas, and winter wonderlands. Enjoy an elf treasure hunt, screenings of The Snowman (Raymond Briggs) and hot chocolate, too!

### Trail Notes: Easy walk brings you to bog worth seeing on Shaker Road

This hike is thanks to David Lamb. I first went on it to check out a nice little bog he told me about. It's a Class Six road. Looked good but my Subaru Legacy didn't agree: \$220 in exhaust repairs.

Going north on Shaker Road, the road goes left – or west – about halfway between David and Janet's and the foot of Shaker Hill, with my Old Ways signs on the right and on the left a large field and then next the road. It's easy walking. About fifteen minutes brings you to a level area. You pass the two entrances to the Shaker Village leach fields on the left. The road becomes rutted here and is sometimes under water coming out of the bog area on the right. (Walk on the stonewall.) The bog is just beyond the stonewall. It's a true bog, totally sphagnum moss and cotton grass.

Shortly after the bog the road goes left parallel to the stonewall,

bordering a long field. The entrance to the field is right at the turn. Walk down the long field beside the wall for the fine view of Oak Hill and Whitney Hill to the south. Walking north along the wall Meadow Pond appears and a short walk brings you to the southeast corner of Meadow. Walk west to the southwest corner of the pond and the outlet dam. (I haven't been to this dam since Anne and I walked down the frozen Peverly Brook years ago in the dead of winter and saw the beaver house with its air hole covered with frost feathers.) Not far downstream is Peverly Marsh.

The whole walk took 1½ hours. There are some very large hardwoods along the road and stonewalls. I'm already looking forward to hiking to the dam from Meadow Pond Trail. One hike seems to lead to another!
