18 19 20 21 22	1. 137 Old Tilton Road, Pitch Perfect Chair Tyson Miller clarified that this was not a public hearing and any issues raised were to be picked up at the public hearing scheduled on January 26. This was an opportunity for questions to be asked of the landowner.
232425262728	LeeAnn Mackey showed members round the proposed campgrounds. The first site was close to Borough Road, and on the opposite side was the new house that is being built. Scott Doherty asked about the sign at the driveway on Borough Road. There would be a gate and the sign will hang on that in the spring.
29 30 31 32 33 34 35 36 37	Members walked past the area where the welcome table would be. Tyson asked about water. There will be no faucets. All water will be bottled. LeeAnn said she would provide 5 gallon bottles of non-consumable water to each campsite and they would sell drinking water as well as wood and bug spray. She said the reservation form makes it clear campers have to bring biodegradable items, so there would not be any need for anyone to wash anything in the brook. LeeAnn has a buggy to drive round with supplies that campers need.
38 39 40	Members were then shown sites # 1-10. Most were for tent only. LeeAnn said that the Fire Department had given her approval.

There will be 4 porta-potties spread round the sites to be shared. She said that site #2 was really close to Borough Road so would be the site to be booked last if the others were full. Site 2 and 3 shared a porta-potty. At site #3 LeeAnn talked about the brook having water at this season but being quite dry in the summer. There was an old logging road there where the Fire Department would be able to get access if there was an emergency once they fix an old gate in the spring.

Site #5 was quite large, having been where equine events had been held in the past. It could be a 2 family campsite and could take a tent and an RV. Site #4 was by a large field, a pasture, with an old disused well, which will be fenced off. There was a brook at the bottom. These two sites would share a porta-potty.

In that field of pasture it was possible to see sites #6, #7, up on the hill and further away sites #8 and #9 behind pine trees. 3 of these sites would share a porta-potty. Hillary Nelson asked if they could see site #10. It was on the pasture field. LeeAnn said this pasture was for equine campers. Tyson asked about the horses and the water. The stream will be fenced off so horses cannot get to it. Joshua Gordon asked about the stream around July 4, and it is dried up usually by then. Equine campers are said to bring their own trailers, fences, water and everything needed. There will be an outer fencing just in case any camper fencing fails. Lucy Nichols asked about horse health and details required. The equine camper forms are different and include information about vaccinations. LeeAnn said much of this information was on the Hipcamp website. Lucy asked if she could make copies available for members to see.

LeeAnn reiterated that she would be posting that use of the brook was forbidden for washing or giving horses drinks.

Lucy asked about mud season and LeeAnn replied that they will be guided by the weather, so were unlikely to have anyone in March when it was mud season, nor in October should there be snow. They were not going to plow any part of the sites.

Tyson suggested she request a waiver for the topographical survey that the Board had requested at the last meeting. It was the reason the application had been deemed incomplete. All these issues would be dealt with at the January 26 meeting.

82 Brendan O'Donnell asked about the trails or roads around the property.

LeeAnn clarified they were old wood roads that had been there for a long time and did not get muddy in spring. She invited members to come back in

spring to take a look. The logging roads are well defined.

Lucy asked about electricity. There is none. Nor any lighting but the portapotties would have solar lights.

Members thanked LeeAnn for showing them round.

2. 175 Lambert Road, Canterbury

Elle Bezanson's campsite is accessible via both Rt 132 N or Intervale Road, off Sandogardy Pond Road in Northfield, on a class VI road.

More than one member asked the size of the property - it is 52 acres. Elle explained that it had been excavated for the building of Interstate 93 and was predominantly sandy soil on the hill and valley. She had been there since 1962. She has 2000 feet of frontage on the interstate. She had been to the Northfield Planning Board for the building of her house. She also noted that the map of the campsites needed re-doing and updating.

Members were shown the various campsites round the property that have already attracted many visitors. Currently there are 9 sites. Elle said she has good reviews on Hipcamp, especially for 'Wolf Swamp'. People had made it clear they really appreciated the privacy of the individual campsites, not being able to see others on the property.

The first was Sunset Hill, which had room for 2 cars. She said some folks had used hammock tents there for shade in the summer. The second, Jesse James Hideout had only room for one tent. The third was Presidential Suite, so named because some Memorial Day visitors had left flags. She has had people from other countries stay there with their pets, as she is pet-friendly. She has a leash law in operation. She also allows horses to stay.

The Camp David site has space for 3 tents. It needed more preparation for the road access for the Fire Department.

Elle also mentioned that she had invited the attorney for the Department of Agriculture to come to her hearing as they were great advocates for Hipcamp.

Members were shown Yogi's Place. As they went downhill Elle described this land being used by the old stage-coach road, and the Pony Express riders. At the bottom was Wolf Swamp, named for the wolves the riders saw. There were 3.3 miles of trails to ride in beyond that leading to Exit 18.

Joshua asked about the arrangement with Best Septic. They come every Tuesday to empty out the 4 porta-potties. Tyson asked about fires — no fires had occurred. She had a hydrant in the Barn though. She also buys cases of water for campers. Tyson asked about washing of dishes and she said that she never had any problem with trash, people took out what they bought in. There were no running streams.

In case of medical emergencies Elle responded that Northfield told her they could get there in 12 minutes, which was much faster than Canterbury. She commented that Northfield had just given permission for a large commercial campsite in town, by the river, to the Partridges. She was not interested in something like that. Hers was small, designed to bring in income to help with her taxes which were \$400 a month. The campsites attracted the least people, with least problems, and she could keep campers separate, which had been appreciated for social distancing in the pandemic. She charged \$35 per night per site.

She also noted she lives off the grid as there is no electricity. She has not been granted an easement by Leroy Glines to bring electricity poles. She has a generator, solar and propane. She puts in solar lights by the portapotties and even has a solar electric fence. The final site seen was called The Meadow, it had a view of the hills and mountains and was the place for astrology, which Hipcamps are encouraged to provide.

Members thanked Elle for showing them round.
