CANTERBURY'S ONE ROOM SCHOOLHOUSES

This issue of the Town Report celebrates the history of Canterbury's one room schoolhouses and particularly, the Center School (Houser Museum). According to Lyford's History, "Prior to 1758, such instruction as the children (received) must have been given at the fireside by parents, though it is not unlikely that the Rev. James Scales, the first minister in town of whom there is record, combined with his pastoral duties the imparting of knowledge to the young." Lyford notes further that in 1765, the Town voted four months schooling for the ensuing year, two months to be kept in winter and two months in the summer. At that time, town boundaries included Canterbury, Loudon, and Northfield. Loudon became a separate township in 1773 and Northfield in 1780. It was not until the annual meeting of 1794 that the Town voted to build six schoolhouses with their locations left to the selectmen, but by 1804 there was dissatisfaction with some locations considered to be inconvenient. It was not until 1814, at a re-convened town meeting, that the final number of nine districts was approved, which seems to have included the Shakers who had been separately recognized in 1812. Over the years, the number of districts was subject to change due to population changes, reaching at least as high as twelve.

The Center School was constructed in 1844 and was the only school building of the time that was made of brick. It served as a one room schoolhouse until 1956 when a new, modem elementary school was built by townspeople (but that's another story). In 1971, under the auspices of the Historical Society, the Center School was dedicated as the Houser Museum, in memory of Eliza-

beth Houser, a long-time and much-loved teacher at the school.

In 2005, the Society embarked on the task to "re-invent" the Center School as a living example of what education in a one room schoolhouse was like in the early part of the 20th century. Given that there were several residents who attended the many one room schoolhouses, and even taught in them, the Society felt it was an important way to capture living memories and history to be shared with current and future generations. The idea was to gather that history, involve the staff and students at the Elementary School in the development of the project, and make the experience a part of the curriculum. Joan Leggett was named to lead the effort and assembled a committee made up of Mary Ellen Fifield, Carolyn Udaloy, Gordon Jackson and Bob Scarponi. As the magnitude of the task became more apparent, so did the number of people involved (see list below). The Museum's contents were moved to the Archive space and the Elkins Memorial Building. Renovations, painting and general clean-up were completed. A generous private donation paid for a heating system to be installed making it possible, for the first time, to use the building year round without a woodstove. Work began in earnest to develop the curriculum in concert with school principal Mary Morrison, enrichment teacher Karen Gingrich, the staff of the Elementary School and Mary Ellen Fifield, who had taught in the one room Carter Hill School. After three years of planning and hard work, everyone's dream was about to be realized! A grand opening celebration was held on November 18, 2007, with more than 140 people attending.

Only days later, on a snowy November morning, and after 51 years with no pupils, Mary Ellen Fifield rang the school bell once again welcoming 25 students to class in the Center School. By the end of the 2008 school year (and in future school years) all the children from the Canterbury Elementary School (grades 1–5) will take part in this program. How pleased Elizabeth Houser

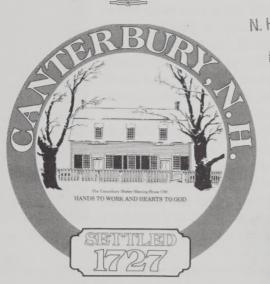

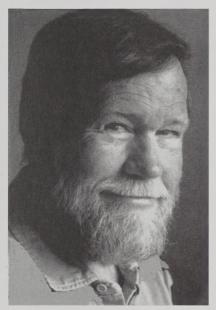

THE 2007 ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TOWN OF CANTERBURY IS DEDICATED TO FRANK TUPPER IN RECOGNITION OF HIS MANY YEARS OF SERVICE TO THE PEOPLE OF CANTERBURY.



Frank moved to Canterbury in 1980 but his connection to the Town goes back much farther. All the way back to Jonathan Avers in the latter part of the 1700s who received a Kings Grant of land in Canterbury on what is now Avers Road. Frank's great grandfathers, his grandfather and now Frank have been able stewards of that land continuously ever since. In his 27 years in Canterbury. Frank has served the Town with distinction on the Budget Committee, Recvcling Committee, through 3 terms as Selectman and is currently serving his 3rd term representing Canterbury in the Legislature. He was instrumental in keeping the Post Office in the town center and was one

of the founders of the "Dance at Da Dump" our annual fund raiser for environmental education.

Perhaps the crowning achievement thus far of the man who proudly wore his King of Da Dump crown is the permanent protection for New Hampshire's rivers and the removal of a major threat to one of Canterbury's greatest natural resources, our magnificent Merrimack River. A change in state law sponsored and shepherded by Frank through the House and Senate over multiple legislative sessions permanently increases setbacks for landfills and waste treatment facilities along designated natural rivers. Characteristically he does not want credit for this achievement for himself, even though he deserves it, preferring instead to give the credit to the townspeople and others.

Through all the years of service Frank has maintained the utmost respect for people, his sense of humor and always a willingness to listen (and of course to dance)!

WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

The polls will be open from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Canterbury in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Canterbury Town Hall in said Canterbury on said Tuesday, the Eleventh day of March, 2007 at seven o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects.

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to the existing Canterbury Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board: *The changes in this amendment would bring the floodplain ordinance into compliance with the requirements of the National Flood Insurance Program.*
- 3. Shall we permit the public library to retain all money it receives from its income-generating equipment to be used for general repairs and upgrading and for the purchase of books, supplies and income-generating equipment?

SECOND SESSION



The second session will be held at the Canterbury Elementary School on Friday, the fourteenth day of March 2008, at seven o'clock in the evening to act on the following subjects:

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred sixty one thousand dollars (\$261,000) for the purchase of a parcel consisting of two contiguous lots on Kimball Pond Road known as Hildreth's field, together 45 acres, Tax Map 8 Lot 037.000 and Tax Map 8 Lot 037.001, and to further authorize the issuance of up to one hundred

thirty thousand five hundred dollars (\$130,500) of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33); to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, obtain and accept federal, state or other aid, if any, which may be available for said project and to comply with all laws applicable to said project; and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue, negotiate, sell and deliver such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon; further to authorize the withdrawal of seventy five thousand five hundred dollars (\$75,500) from the Conservation Commission Fund and fifty five thousand dollars (\$55,000) from the Conservation Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose. *Two-thirds ballot vote required. Recommended by the Selectmen*.

- 5. To raise such money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations (\$2,139,023) for the same. *Recommended by the Selectmen*.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy nine thousand five hundred dollars (\$79,500) for the purchase of a highway truck. *Recommended by the Selectmen*.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight thousand dollars (\$8,000) for the purpose of rebuilding the pump in Engine Three. *Recommended by the Selectmen*.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for interest on Tax Anticipation Notes. *Recommended by the Selectmen*.
- 9. To see if the town will modify the disabled exemptions from property tax in the Town of Canterbury from \$35,000 to \$60,000, pursuant to RSA 72:37 b. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years and own and occupy the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by a spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$13,400, or, if married, a combined net income of not more than \$20,400; and own net assets not in excess of \$35,000 excluding the value of the person's residence. *Recommended by the Selectmen*.
- 10. Shall the town accept the provisions of RSA 202-A:4-c providing that any town at annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the public library trustees to

apply for, accept and expend without further action by the meeting, unanticipated money from, state, federal, or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year? Recommended by the Selectmen

- 11. Shall the town accept the provisions of RSA 202-A:4d to authorize the public library trustees to accept gifts of personal property, other than money, which may be offered to the library for any public purpose, and such authorization shall remain in effect until rescinded in a vote at town meeting? No acceptance of any personal property under the authority of this section shall be deemed to bind the town or the library trustees to raise, appropriate, or expend any public funds for the operation, maintenance, repair, or replacement of such personal property. *Recommended by the Selectmen*
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to approve the following resolution to be forwarded to our State Representatives, our State Senator and our Governor.

Resolved: We the citizens of Canterbury, NH believe in a New Hampshire that is just and fair. The property tax has become unjust and unfair. State leaders who take a pledge for no new taxes perpetuate higher and higher property taxes. We call on our State Representatives, our State Senator and our Governor to reject the "Pledge," have an open discussion covering all options, and adopt a revenue system that lowers property taxes. By Petition.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

TOWN OF CANTERBURY MINUTES OF TOWN MEETING MARCH 23, 2007 SECOND SESSION

Town Moderator, Wayne Mann, opened the recessed 265th Town Meeting at 7:00 p.m. on Friday, March 23, 2007. The meeting was postponed from the original date of March 16, 2007 due to a snowstorm. The salute of the flag was lead by the moderator and the colors were presented by Davey Rauseo and Nick Barous of Boy Scout Troop 296.

The moderator pointed out the fire exits and introduced the dais. Bob Steenson presented outgoing Selectmen James Bassett with a clock in appreciation of Jim's dedicated service to the Town as a Selectmen and Planning Board member over the past 20 years.

The Moderator spoke about the town report with the Town Hall on the cover and the report is dedicated to Jim and Nancy Lilly for their years of volunteer service to the town.

Results of the 1st session voting were read and a review of the ground rules was presented.

3. To raise such money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

Motion Doug Russwick, second Michael Capone

Jim Bassett reviewed the budget and noted that a correction should be made to the Sub-Total with Warrant Articles Proposed 2007 amount from \$1,921,076 to \$2,004,868.

A presentation was made by Ollie Fifield and Ken Folsom to go over the findings of the Advisory Committee on Town Administration regarding the part-time Town Administrator and bookkeeper.

Jim Bassett thanked the Advisory Committee on Town Administration including Chair Ollie Fifield, Secretary Brian Collins, Selectmen's Representative Briggs Lockwood, Mary Witschonke, Barbie Tilton, Catharine Newick, Ken Folsom, Anne Emerson, Ben Bynum and Chris Blair.

Bob Drew spoke in favor of having an administrative assistant but is against passing the budget with the two line items for the town administrator and part-time bookkeeper salaries and benefits.

Ollie Fifield said that surrounding towns with a town administrator saved the town their salary in the first year.

Bob Scarponi spoke in favor of the town administrator as currently there is no comprehensive set of policies in the selectmen's office and no comprehensive set of procedures or personnel policies for general business management. We react to events as they happen with no plan or coordination of purchasing, financial management or crisis management. We want to run the town in an effective way that will result in good government for all of us.

Meg Miller supports volunteers and recommendations of the committee Leonard Mordarski moved the question, second Gordon Jackson

Article 3 was voted on and passed

4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty one thousand two hundred twenty five dollars (\$51,225) for the purchase of a highway truck and to further withdraw twenty eight thousand dollars (\$28,000) from the highway truck capital reserve previously established. The balance of twenty three thousand two hundred twenty five dollars (\$23,225) is to come from general taxation. *Recommended by the Selectmen*.

Cheryl Gordon moved, second Leslie Keeler

Phil Stone said this truck is replacing an 11-year-old truck and it's the most used piece of equipment.

Article 4 was voted on and passed

5. To see if the town will modify the elderly exemptions from property tax in the Town of Canterbury, based on assessed value for qualified taxpayers, to be as follows: for a person 65 years of age and older, sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000). To qualify the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years, own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by such person's spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must not have a net income in excess of \$25,000, or, if married, a combined net income of not more than \$34,000; and own assets not in excess of \$75,000, excluding the value of the person's residence. *Recommended by the Selectmen*.

Doug Russwick moved, second Cheryl Gordon

Steve Wearn said the amount should be increased so that some of these people pay no taxes at all.

Barbara Bois wants to see the handicapped exemption increased to the same amount.

Bob Steenson said the Selectmen agree but legally can't change the warrant article. The Selectmen will talk to the town attorney to find out if they can handle handicapped exemptions on a case-by-case basis this year and will place the matter on the warrant next year.

Ken Jordan spoke in opposition, as lowering age to 65 with \$60,000 is not a realistic view of future and present. Federal government doesn't see 65 as old and should restrict the age to 75 and older.

James Kotusky said that when elderly sell their home, back taxes should be paid from proceeds of sale.

Cheryl Gordon spoke regarding the elderly tax lien policy currently in place. The town is paid upon the sale of the home for people who qualify but it is restrictive.

Jack Evan moved the question, second Cheryl Gordon

Article 5 was voted on and passed

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred forty one thousand seven hundred fifty dollars (\$141,750) for the acquisition of a Rescue/Forestry vehicle for the Fire Department with twenty three thousand dollars (\$23,000) to come from the Rescue Equipment Capital Reserve (which includes \$6,250 to fund Canterbury's Share to acquire the grant, with one hundred eighteen thousand seven hundred fifty dollars (\$118,750) from the Assistance to Firefighters Grant. Recommended by the Selectmen.

Motion Doug Russwick, second Rachel Baker

Fire Chief Dale Caswell made a brief presentation in favor of the article.

Article 6 was voted on and passed

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen thousand eight hundred dollars (\$15,800) for new, precision, aerial photographs of the town for use in the digital tax map projects. Recommended by the Selectmen.

Motion Jennifer Hopkins, second Kelly Short

Barbara Bois said that taking a picture is inaccurate.

Bob Steenson answered that the photos are highly accurate as they are ground controlled with GPS and are only part of the parcel reconciliation process. They are currently reviewing every deed for its intent and description to match to photos and should be done by August or September. Photos will be available for review at Town Office.

David Tirrell-Wysocki asked if town could offset expense by offering photos for sale to owners.

Patti Capone moved the question, second Peg Mastey

Article 7 was voted on and passed

8. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the maintenance and repair of Town Buildings and to appropriate the sum of five thousand five hundred dollars (\$5,500)

as an initial funding amount. Further name the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend from this Capital Reserve Fund. *Recommended by the Selectmen*.

Motion Dwight Keeler, second Leslie Keeler

Priscilla Lockwood raised a point of order as this dollar amount is already in the budget and was voted on. *Motion is made to remove language "and to appropriate the sum of five thousand five hundred dollars (\$5,500) as an initial funding amount" to avoid doubling this dollar amount.*

Second Jeff Souther

Question 8 is amended to strike the words "and to appropriate the sum of five thousand five hundred dollars (\$5,500) as an initial funding amount"

Amendment passes

Article 8 as amended was voted on and passed

9. To see if the Town will go on record in support of effective actions by the President and Congress to address the issue of climate change which is increasingly harmful to the environment and economy of New Hampshire and to the future well being of the people of Canterbury.

These actions include:

- 1. Establish of a national program requiring reductions of U.S. greenhouse gas emissions while protecting the U.S. economy.
- Creation of a major national research initiative to foster rapid development of sustainable energy technologies thereby stimulating new jobs and

In addition, the town of Canterbury encourages New Hampshire citizens to work for emission reductions within their communities, and we ask our Selectmen to consider the appointment of a voluntary energy committee to recommend local steps to save energy and reduce emissions. The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted to the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation, to the President of the United States, and to declared candidates for those offices. *Recommended by the Selectmen*.

Motion Melanie Stephens, second Barbara Bois

John Bouton spoke to this article saying that this is a bi-partisan issue addressing climate change. 180 towns in the state have placed this article on their warrants and over 150 have passed it. We need to send a message to our leaders that we are concerned about climate change as it is affecting our state's livelihood and quality of life.

Ann Thomas moved the question, second Leonard Mordarski

Article 9 was voted on and passed

10. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

TOWN OF CANTERBURY 2007 ANNUAL REPORT

Jim Bassett spoke about the audit from last year showing a cost overrun of approximately \$80,000 on the town municipal complex, library and town hall projects. It appears that a bookkeeping error occurred several years ago that overstated the amount of money that the project had available to spend. This was discovered after the project was completed. All expenditures have been accounted for and there are no funds missing. Inquiry is continuing as to how and what happened.

Ken Sorlin said that any town that can hold its expenses from one year to another has a good board of selectmen.

Carolyn French-Witham would like to see our recreation department expanded and more recreational activities happening in town.

Keith Brown would like to invite all town officers to visit with the Sherwood Forest Shores Association.

Toni Halla asked that people be made aware that the last name of the library benefactor is Hutchins not Hutchinson.

Jim Miller made a motion to dissolve the meeting. Michael Capone seconded the motion. The meeting was dissolved at 9:17 p.m.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

2007 was a year of structural change and personnel growth for the Town of Canterbury as the Board and its dedicated staff worked to address the ever increasing demands and complexity of small town government in New Hampshire. The Board welcomed new Selectman Ken Folsom, elected in March 2007.

Acting upon the recommendations of the 2006 Advisory Committee on Town Administration, as endorsed by the voters at Town Meeting in 2006, the Board engaged the Local Government Center to assist us in hiring a part-time Town Administrator. Following an extensive search and interview process, the Board was very pleased to welcome Roger Becker to the Canterbury team in November 2007. Roger brings many years of experience as both Selectman and Town Administrator for the Town of Webster to Sam Lake House and the benefit of this experience, along with his professional skill and cheerful demeanor has already made a significant positive impact on our town government.

Also in accordance with the Advisory Committee recommendations, the Board welcomed Mary Hauptman to a new position as part-time Bookkeeper for the Town of Canterbury. Mary, along with Roger and our indispensable assistant Jan Stout have and will continue to focus heavily on improved bookkeeping and additional financial oversight.

The Board is pleased to report that for the first time in many years the Canterbury Police Department is fully staffed. Relying on the assistance of the Local Government Center and the expertise of a panel of current and retired Chiefs of Police, the board reviewed and interviewed a number of qualified candidates for the position of Chief of Police with the result that our own Sergeant John LaRoche was promoted to Chief in June. The Board also welcomed Ernie Beaulieu as our full time sergeant and Mark Ashland as part time officer.

Norman Bowles, honorary citizen of Canterbury and long-serving Manager of the Transfer Station / Recycling Center decided to step down from his management role in September. The Board thanks Norman for his many years of hard work and dedication to serving the citizens of Canterbury. The Selectmen and Road Agent Phil Stone promoted Sara Taft to Transfer Station Manager in October.

The replacement of our old, outdated and inaccurate tax maps with new, digital tax maps based on new aerial photography, GPS coordinates and extensive deed research was completed in December. The Selectmen extend our appreciation to Assessing Clerk Ben Bynum for his hard work as this project would not have gone as smoothly as it did, nor would it have completed on time without his extra effort.

The Board would like to extend our sincere thanks and tremendous appreciation to all Town Departments: Phil Stone and the Highway Department, Chief LaRoche and the Police Department and especially to the dedicated volunteers of the Canterbury Volunteer Fire Department for your service to the citizens of Canterbury.

A review of the reports from prior years reveals a citizenry dedicated to our community and willing to step forward to help their neighbors and their town. That tradition and those values continued in 2007 and continue to make Canterbury a very special place. We are grateful to have been given the opportunity to serve the Town and we thank all of those who serve on our boards and committees, who have brought their concerns and suggestions to Town officials and all who invest their time and energy in our community.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CANTERBURY VOLUNTEER FIRE & RESCUE

Our new combination forestry/light rescue is now in service and has contributed directly to the success of our operations. Thanks to a \$118,750. FEMA grant and our town reserve funds, the truck was completed to our exacting specifications and placed in service this last September. Designated Rescue 1, the unit responds to all medical calls, car accidents, rescue calls, searches, structure fires, and forest fires. We have applied for and received over \$200,000. worth of grants since 1991 including portable and mobile radios, SCBA (air packs), an infrared camera, forestry equipment, a multi-gas meter, and our new forestry/rescue truck.

Our fire and rescue calls have increased this year to 283. The number of calls have increased dramatically over the past few years and have prompted us to propose to the selectmen and the 2009 Town meeting that our members be paid by the emergency call. The towns of Boscawen, Loudon, Belmont and others all have a pay-by-call system in place and ours will be modeled after theirs. Our members meet every Monday night for training, maintenance and business; attend outside trainings and other fire related meetings during the week, and respond on average to five emergency calls per week from their home or workplace. Pay-by call may just provide the incentive to increase member responses and help compensate our members for the extraordinary hours of commitment to our town.

A wet spring helped keep brush fires in check, but illegal burning of brush and construction debris still accounts for many calls. We document the illegal burn and work closely with DES and the forest protection bureau to make those responsible understand the law and the possible fines attached and to reimburse the town for our expenses and time. Our new forestry/rescue has already aided us in extinguishing an illegal burn and has exceeded our expectations in many other ways. EMS (emergency medical service) and rescue calls still account for two-thirds of our total business and responses to the Interstate Highway make up close to half our total of fire, EMS, and motor vehicle fires and accident responses.

To provide the life and property protection you have come to expect from us, we have 20 all-volunteer members responding from their homes or from the workplace. We operate seven vehicles: two pumpers; a hazardous materials/reserve pumper; large and a small military surplus forestry rigs; a newly refurbished utility pickup; and our new forestry/rescue combination truck.

We particularly enjoy our community involvement which include fire truck rides and the parade and fireworks on the 4th of July; fire prevention day with the school children, medical assistance at the Canterbury fair; visits from the Boy Scouts and 4-H to the fire house; and assistance to our citizens with fire and non-fire issues. We inspect new chimneys, new installations of wood stoves, foster homes, group homes, all schools (including pre-schools, day care centers, private primary and intermediate schools, and the public school). In addition, we are involved with the planning board in the approval process of commercial businesses and sub-divisions, and assist in the approval and design process of fire detection and suppression equipment in residences and public buildings. Please feel free to stop by the firehouse any Monday evening and view our equipment and meet our members.

In addition to responding to calls, we had a very busy year supporting events in and around the communities to include Boscawen Old Home Day, Canterbury Fair, and the First Aid booth at the Hopkinton Fair

We are pleased to announce that we recently hired Paramedic Shawn Brechtel as our Full-Time Deputy Director. Paramedic Brechtel is a Boscawen resident who brings many years of experience as a professional Paramedic/Fire Fighter. He has volunteered for Penacook Rescue for over 10 years prior to this appointment. We look forward to working with him and his interaction with the towns of Boscawen and Canterbury.

Lastly, I would like to thank everyone in the community who supported us this past year; especially our dedicated members, our valued and respected past members and the men & women of the Boscawen and Canterbury Police, Fire and Town Departments. We truly could not exist without your support.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

Last year's election resulted in Fred Norton and Tyson Miller being elected to three year terms. Art Rose and Ken Stern were appointed to fill the seats of Don Burgess and Bill Egan respectively, who stepped down. Kent Ruesswick joined the board as an alternate. This last year saw a decrease in the number of public hearings to come before the Board:

- 1. Site Plan Review hearing
- 2. Subdivision hearings resulting in the creation of 5 new lots.

This year we have begun the process of revising and updating the Master Plan. The purpose of a Master Plan is to provide an opportunity for the community to look ahead, establish new visions and directions, set goals, and map out plans for the future. This process is building on work done by past Planning Boards going back decades and is being driven by a committee made up of Planning Board members and volunteers from the community. Input has been sought from others through a survey and a public session.

We continue to review the plan for an "over 55" manufactured housing park off Route 106. The applicant has experienced some delays with State and Federal permits. Part of the proposed plan includes protecting a section of backland with a conservation easement.

We are once again fortunate to be thanking Nancy Lilly for another year (her thirteenth!) of service to the Town as Planning Board secretary.

As always there are challenges on the horizon. The Board will be looking for new alternates to serve in the coming years. It's a great way to be involved in shaping the future of your town.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CANTERBURY CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Easements have been the focus of the Conservation Commission in 2007. Because of a recent change in the tax law enabled a 'this year only' tax deduction for Conservation Easements; the Commission has been working with a number of townspeople in an effort to secure easements on their land. As is always the case, an easement is not as simple as it first appears, and while we will not receive any easements this year, we are still working to secure one for next year. This process has helped focus our efforts on the process of easement acquisitions and we have worked to develop an Easement/Acquisition philosophy; created a template for Conservation Easement language and made an Easement Process Timeline.

The Conservation Commission has listened carefully to a variety of visitors who have instructed us in Conservation subdivisions, the Designation of Prime Wetlands and the development of a Wetlands Capacity Study. We have submitted articles in the town newsletter throughout the year, hoping to educate and call attention to issues which concern us.

Due to the hard work of many people, the financial commitment of the townspeople, and the wisdom of our Representative, Frank Tupper, legislation was passed this year increasing the setback requirements of new landfills located near all the State's Designated Rivers.

We have worked with members of the Sherwood Forest community as they try to address their growing water problems. Water quality will continue to be an important issue for the Conservation Commission in the future. With the Planning Board, we worked this year on developing some changes to the existing Zoning Ordinances that would better protect our wetlands. This year as well we began water testing on Horseshoe Pond and we hope to be able to fund the testing of other town water bodies next year.

We have organized a group of volunteer Land Stewards to help us steward our existing conservation lands and we have developed a Conservation Goals for Eased Lands document. We welcome anyone who would be interested in becoming a Land Steward volunteer.

Commission members have been working on the revision of the Master Plan in order to reflect the conservation values of the townspeople as we anticipate a future of increased development and growing pressure on our water sources.

We welcome anyone who wishes to be involved in conservation work to come to our regular meetings, the second Monday of each month.

Perhaps this year's most exciting accomplishment was the transformation of the Houser Museum back to the building's original use as the Center (one-room) Schoolhouse. Our Town Report focuses on this wonderful accomplishment, made possible through the inspired leadership of Joan Leggett, many hours of volunteer help and the commitment of the staff and students of our Elementary School. We are very grateful!

In the spring, we began work on the Elkins Memorial Building including window repairs, the installation of new lighting, outside repairs/painting, grounds maintenance and inside renovations/painting. Jane Balshaw was invaluable as our leader in coordinating and planning these efforts along with the help of Benton Beltramo, David Lamb, Ted West, Craig Briggs, Gordon Jackson, Pam Jackson, Bob Drew, and many volunteers. Work continues and we expect to "open" in the next several months.

Our entire Collection has been consolidated in the Archive Space at the Library and the Elkins Memorial Building. A new computer and museum software has been purchased so that all Collection and Genealogy information can be entered and be made available to students, researchers and the general public.

We presented five programs over the past year and thank the N.H. Humanities Council for their support and sponsorship.

The Society is committed to accomplishing its work through private donations and volunteer help. UPPER MERRIMACK RIVER LOCAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE

With assistance from Bill Arcieri, VHB, Inc. through a contract with the Central NH Regional Planning Commission and a grant from the NH Department of Environmental Services, the Upper Merrimack River Local Advisory Committee (UMRLAC) conducted an intensive process to re-write the *Upper Merrimack Management and Implementation Plan*. The new *Plan* addresses emerging issues in the upper Merrimack and provides vision, guidance, and watershed management recommendations for state agencies and municipalities. It includes logic model measurable outcome sections on water quality, water quantity, agriculture, recreation, wildlife, historical and archeological, geologic and natural features, fish and aquatic, vegetation, buffers and setbacks, and land and open space. The *Plan* can be downloaded and printed from Merrimack River.org as a PDF or you can use the interactive web-enabled version. A tremendous thank you to Bill for guiding UMRLAC through the planning process and producing a first-rate document.

The UMRLAC worked with Yellahoose to re-design its website. The new website features not only an interactive way to view the new *Plan*, but also downloads of documents, water quality data, and other resources. Thank you to Jim Cradock, Yellahoose, for his great work on the new and exciting <u>Merrimack River.org</u>. Please visit <u>MerrimackRiver.org</u> to learn more about the Merrimack River, UMRLAC, and its work.

In June, the UMRLAC hosted the state Rivers Management Advisory Committee's meeting along with a lunch and canoe trip from Franklin to Boscawen. RMAC members were treated to a beautiful and windy trip down the river and were provided with local information on habitat, history, and watershed conditions.

The UMRLAC hosted a legislative training session conducted by Derek Durbin, New Hampshire Lakes Association, and Carl Paulsen, New Hampshire Rivers Council. Several UMRLACers participated in the November state Watershed Conference in Concord. Thank you to Steve Landry for representing not only UMRLAC but several other Local River Management Advisory Committees in the Community Technical Assistance Program (I-93 expansion) process.

UMRLAC begins its twelfth year of the Upper Merrimack Monitoring Program (UMMP). The UMMP owes much of its success to strong municipal support and that from its Adopt-a-River Site Sponsors. The Program's Adopt-a-River Site Sponsors include Aquarian Analytical Laboratories, Inc.; Aries Engineering, Inc.; Checkmate Expert Payroll Services; Elektrisola; Franklin Savings Bank; Franklin Wastewater Treatment Facility; Public Service Company of NH Corporate Offices and Merrimack Station; and Watts Regulator/Webster Valve. Many thanks to the Conservation Commissions and Towns and Cities of Boscawen, Bow, Canterbury, Concord, Franklin, and Northfield for their ongoing support

and for graciously hosting Upper Merrimack River Local Advisory Committee meetings. The Concord Community Cooperative chose UMRLAC as one of its twelve nonprofits to receive a percentage of their revenues in 2007.

The October meeting was hosted by the Franklin Waste Water Treatment Plant (FWWTP). Staff provided a tour of this fascinating facility for the UMR-LACers. Since 1995, the FWWTP provided *E. coli* sample processing for the UMMP with the assistance of over a dozen collection volunteers. The data are the first volunteer monitoring program's to be entered into the state Environmental Monitoring Database. These data are provided to the NH Department of Environmental Services and posted at MerrimackRiver.org for us by health officers, resource managers and planners, and visitors to the area.

Graciously hosted by St. Paul's School, Bug Nights continues its popularity in the region, entering its twelfth year in 2008 with dozens of individuals volunteering their collection and identification services. The UMRLAC has contracted with a consulting firm for a data analysis and recommendations report. This analysis will guide planning efforts for the next decade.

The UMRLAC continued to review and provide comment on project plans and proposals including the relicensing application for several hydroelectric facilities on the Merrimack River, and site specific and wetlands applications, and the existing and proposed landfills (Franklin and Canterbury, respectively).

Officers were elected in November: Michele Tremblay, Chair; Steve Landry, Vice-Chair, Krista Crowell, Treasurer; and Gary Lynn, Secretary. The UMRLAC is pleased to welcome Harry Anderson and Bill Dawson, both of Northfield, as the newest "UMRLACers." A very warm welcome back to Robert Wyatt, Concord, formerly an UMRLACer representing the Town of Bow.

Please visit UMRLAC's brand new website at www.merrimackriver.org for further information on the river, committee membership, activities, maps, water quality data, and photographs of brave and selfless volunteers in action. The UMRLAC meetings are held on a rotating basis in its six represented communities on the second Monday of each month at 7:00 pm. An informational "Around the Watershed" session is conducted at each meeting. All are welcome to attend. ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE CANTERBURY TRANSFER STATION

The amount of solid waste going from Canterbury to the Wheelabrator incinerator decreased by 14% from 2006 to 2007 with a corresponding increase in the amount of materials being recycled Over 9,000 lbs of aluminum cans, 240 tons of paper, and 17 tons of plastics were recycled generating revenue for the town. An impressive 10,800 lbs of our newly recyclable lids and assorted "yogurt cup" plastics were collected and removed from the waste stream in just six months!

While a 14% overall decrease may not seem incredibly significant, consider this: Only 56% of solid waste being delivered to the Wheelabrator Incinerator actually comes from the transfer station and therefore from the residents participating in PAYT. The rest comes from residents and organizations opting out of the program and paying for private dumpsters. Obviously, Canterbury could do a better job if participation rates were higher, but those who are recycling at the transfer station can be quite proud of their efforts.

Other highlights from 2007 include Sarah Taft transitioning into the managerial position at the transfer station as Norman Bowles decreases his responsibilities, the annual road-side trash pick-up, a public viewing of *An Inconvenient Truth*, a seminar/discussion on simplifying our lives led by Canterbury's own Mary Kerwin, and a thought-provoking presentation by author and sustainability expert Jim Merkel. A special thanks to the Dance at the Dump sponsors whose contributions made some of these events possible.

Due to Statehouse and Selectmen's duties, relocation, and the simple need for a rest, the committee has lost several creative and committed members this year, including Frank Tupper, Bob Steenson, Sarah Tirrell-Wysocki, and Melanie Stevens. We did welcome aboard Seth Cohn who, along with Lori Lockwood has been leading the effort to keep the Treasure House staffed. A special thanks to all of the Treasure House volunteers. As always we welcome new volunteers for the committee, the Treasure House, or both.

We are happy to report to all member communities that 2007 marked our eighteenth complete year of successful operations. Some items of interest follow:

- The 2008 budget reflects a tipping fee of \$42.55 per ton. This represents an increase of \$0.05/ton.
- A total of 134,358 tons of Co-op waste was delivered to the Wheelabrator facility this year. This represents a decrease of 11,228 tons from 2006.
- A total of 60,562 tons of ash were delivered to the Franklin ash monofill for disposal. The ash landfill continues to operate very well. Phase III Stage V is being filled at this time. Phase IV construction has been completed and will provide disposal capacity through 2009. The Phase V permit has been approved. We expect construction to start in 2008.

The Joint Board has approved the continued exploration of the idea of building a single stream recycling facility to improve recycling rates. The Co-op has visited several single stream facilities and has contacted many communities in an effort to determine interest in joining with the Co-op in this effort. A final decision is expected to be made in May of 2008.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE ELKINS LIBRARY

The second full year in the new Elkins Library was as successful as the first. Circulation was up and new patrons were added. The number of programs sponsored by the library increased to 80. Internet usage, both for the library's computers and wireless access, increased as well.

Programs included a summer reading program that involved over 200 children in reading activities, crafts and a musical performance. A summer program for the whole community was African Rhythms, a drumming group. Craft nights at the library had patrons knitting and painting nesting dolls. Ben Killam spoke passionately about NH black bears. The book discussion group met monthly.

An unfortunate break in to the library occurred late in 2006. Thanks to our trust fund monies the library was able to install an alarm system that guards both the library and the historical society and to quickly replace the computers while awaiting insurance money.

Passes to the Planetarium, Shaker Village, The Fells, Strawberry Banke, and the Museum of Fine Arts in Boston continue to be available to our patrons to allow them to visit for free or at a reduced rate. Our reference book selection continues to be updated. The brick memory garden has added bricks and has room for more.

2007 saw the donation of a beautiful bronze statue of a young girl reading. This statue was given by Donald Eckhardt in memory of his wife Mary. The statue named "Gretchen "by the library staff is a magnet for young children and a beautiful addition to the circulation area. 2005 saw a generous gift from Mary Hutchins' estate. The endowment set up from that gift has grown and will continue to benefit the library and the town for many years to come.

More staffing hours have allowed the library to deal with the increased activity and patronage over the past year. New trustees included Kelly Papps and Linda Riendeau. We are sad to lose Rob Riley's from on the Board. His expertise will be missed.

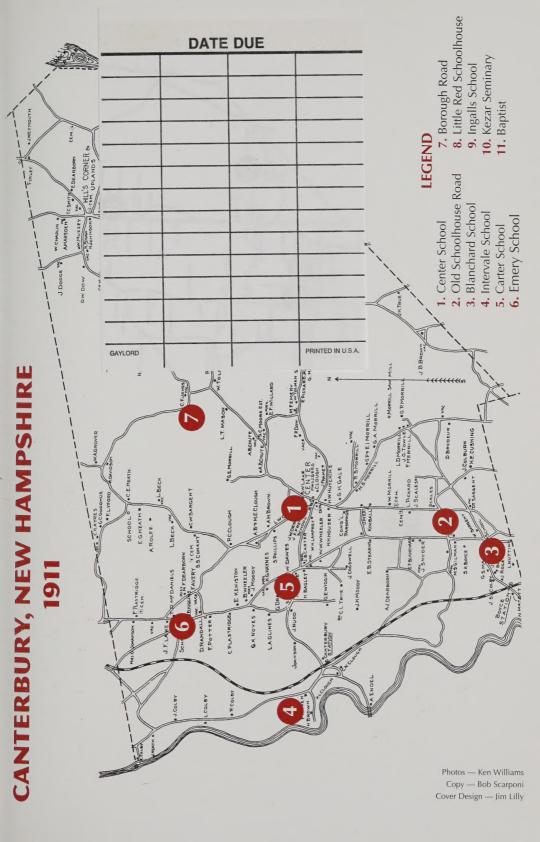
