Dr. Paul Kruzel, DDS, a beloved husband, father, Baboo (grandfather), brother and Cubs fan, peacefully passed away on

May 22, 2023. Born on November 23, 1950 in Chicago, III., to Lorraine and Walter Kruzel, Dr. Kruzel lived an extraordinary life full of service, creativity and dedication to his loved ones.

Upon graduating from the University of Illinois College of Dentistry in 1978, Dr. Kruzel joined the United States Army as a pharmacy technician, serving his country with distinction. His dedication to medicine led him to serve as a Captain in the Air Force, where he further honed his skills as a dentist. He is also survived by his sisters, Amy

Briguglio, Carol Swenson, Rita DeStefano and Mary Kosik. His family was the center of his world, and his loving spirit will continue to live on through them.

In his 72 years, Paul lived a life filled with purpose, love, and joy. His unwavering commitment to his love for his family and his generous spirit will be deeply missed by all who knew him.

I love to take our churching outside whenever we can. Under the Center's wide sky, shaded by two magnificent maples, it's

easy to celebrate the gifts of creation and strengthen the ties of community. Freed from our pews, we can sit in a circle and see who we are. Kathy graciously lugs the keyboard outside to help with hymns, and we find ourselves enjoying old traditions in new ways. Then, it's an easy step from worship to fellowship on the grass—sharing news, coffee and tea, and of course, delicious snacks. We could call it coffee hour, but fellowship really is what we're

Now we want to give back to this amazing community by lending our experience and creativity to reimagine the tradition of the Canterbury Country Store.

As you may know, the store has not been profitable and the Canterbury Community Market LLC, (owner/manager of the property), and Friends of the Canterbury Store have subsidized it for years. Like many country stores, the old model just isn't profitable anymore. That, combined with the need to remove lead from the store apartment, caused the management team to look for a sustainable solution. The LLC started looking to local marketing consultants and exploring other business ideas. During this time, we were approached by town residents Jane and Dave Balshaw with a proposal for a sustainable store model. After much back and forth, we signed a lease on June 5. The transition to the new store has begun!

Toni and Joe Halla have done a great job keeping the store running all these years, through good times and bad, and we all are so grateful for their service to the community! Join the Friends of the Canterbury Store on July 1 from 6 to 8:30 pm at the Gazebo for a prefireworks celebration for Toni and Joe.

There will be necessary changes to the property so get ready! There will be a new ADA public bathroom, indoor seating areas and a new kitchen ... all to be constructed while the store is closed. During this time, the post office will remain open.

The Canterbury Morris Team (Side) started with children, The Morris Minors. Michael Winograd watched them and said hey, let's put together an adult team. So, the

Canterbury Morris
Dancers grew
from that. Michael
played the
tambourine and it
became the "in
thing" to join the
side. At one point
we had 10 men,
18 women, (some



of them formed a garland team), eight teens, girls, with their own kit, and 14 children. Fifty dancers, all from Canterbury. It was the largest mixed (men and women, boys and girls) side in the world, all from one town.

Michael suggested we go down to dance at Quincy Market, but I said no, that's New Cambridge Morris's turf. So, Michael said okay, let's go to England and dance there. We didn't, but shortly after that the Bampton side, the oldest Morris team in the world, came over from Oxfordshire and danced at the Canterbury Fair. Michael took one look at them and said, "Did I say we were going to England?"

We've had some ups and downs since then, faltering close, but Ruth Heath and Polly Camire got us going again. Then came Covid. In 2021, the full Canterbury Morris side came in full blue and white kits. Nobody was in town to watch. Last year, a team came garbed in tiedye T-shirts. They were pretty good, but not as good as us!

We are having some difficulty in lining up the Canterbury side for this year's fair. There is the possibility that we can arouse some of the old Phoenix Morris Dancers, decrepit as they may be, to help keep a tradition alive. If you're interested in joining us, call me at 603-783-4719.



Food Pantry's Facebook call for help yields more than 1,500 cans of soup!

In May, the Loudon Food Pantry gave out 5,281 meals worth of food to 313 individuals, of which 184 were aged 60 and older (59 percent), 52 were aged 18 or under (17 percent), and 77 were between those ages (25 percent).

Our appreciation: When we put the call for canned soups donations on our Facebook page, we never anticipated what the response would be. Thanks to everyone that donated, we received more than 1,500 cans of soup. Our elderly guests use soup as a meal when they don't really feel hungry but know they need to eat something, or are just too tired to cook. Others use soup as a supplement to sandwiches. However they use the soup, we are very happy to have it on hand to give out. Thank you so much!

Canterbury Fair: The food pantry will have a booth set up at the Canterbury Fair on July 29 to answer any questions and sign people up to get food. Our cash collection bins and our food collection bins will be there as well! Hope to see you there!

Canterbury Community Farmers Market: The market has been very helpful in assisting our Canterbury patrons in receiving fresh fruits and vegetables each year. Our patrons are very grateful for the opportunity.

How we feed our guests: The typical food allotment for a single person is nine meals for three days. This is under the assumption that the person also receives SNAP, or food stamps, as a supplement to the food received. Unfortunately, not everyone qualifies for the SNAP program. After reading many different articles about how pantries feed their guests, we decided to try something different. One article said that after one or two trips to a pantry, when they start to feel more secure, most guests will start to take only what they need. They will always keep a little extra in case they can't make it to the pantry that week (i.e., sick child, appointments, etc.) We did it and it works! We have guests that feel more food secure and take less than what we offered them on a weekly basis as a result. If they can't make their appointment to get food, they call and now tell us not to worry. They'll be okay for the week. With your help, we can continue helping people feel food secure!

Do you need food? Call me at (603) 724-9731 to see if you qualify. The process is simple and if you have all your paperwork, you'll receive food the same day as your appointment! You'll find our hours and location in the listings on Page 13.

finally up and running. There were delays because of the needed power upgrade to operate the baler. We are still waiting for all the needed electrical components, but Larry Martin, our electrician, was able to safely use a temporary connection to power the unit. The Transfer Station staff and Highway employees were trained on the operations of the baler and we will be moving loose cardboard from the trailer to the baler to make bales on Tuesdays.

This requires hand sorting of cardboard to remove any materials that would not be accepted as "cardboard" by our vendor. Quite a bit of "non-cardboard" had to be removed in order to make the first bale. In order to make the process of baling cardboard run smoothly we ask that only "corrugated cardboard" be placed in the trailer. All other paper products can be placed in the "mixed paper" trailer. Please see an attendant if you have any questions. In the future we will be baling plastic and mixed paper. Thank you for your cooperation and patience.

Starting Something New & Carrying Tradition Onward

Community Power electricity rate savings will show up on your July utility bill

There are four things to know this month about Community Power in Canterbury.

First, the crossover in June from Unitil and Eversource to Canterbury Community Power (CCP) went smoothly, quietly

and overwhelmingly. Out of 896 Canterbury customers served by these two delivery utilities, 891, (98 percent), are now taking power from CCP at the low "Granite Basic" rate of 15.8 cents/kWh. Two other customers opted up to "Clean 50" at 16.9 cents, and three more to 100 percent renewable energy at the "Clean 100" rate of 19.1 cents. Fourteen Unitil and Eversource



default service customers opted out of Community Power, offset by nine Competitive Energy Supply customers who opted in.

Rate changes will appear on your July utility bill. All in all, Canterbury has given a big thumbs up to Community Power!

Second, the Community Power Coalition of NH (CPCNH) calculates that CCP will generate an estimated \$143,000 in "total community benefits" for the town's residents and businesses through the end of the current rate period on July 31. Of that total, 40 percent went to provide customer bill savings through reduced energy rates, and 60 percent (\$85,000) will go into locally controlled reserve funds to enable long-term rate stability, innovative clean energy projects and services or even further rate reductions.

Third, for PV solar customers, we can report only painfully slow progress in pushing Eversource and Unitil to provide the customer-specific data on exports to the grid that is required by law and needed by CPCNH in order to offer favorable terms to net-metered customers. Negotiations continue, but it looks increasingly as if the Public Utilities Commission will need to resolve the dispute in an adversarial proceeding – and that could take months more. Until this is resolved, we recommend that solar PV customers stay with their delivery utilities for energy supply, unless they export no net energy to the grid because they never generate more than they use themselves.

Fourth, new and lower energy rates for both Community Power and utility default energy service customers will go into effect for the next six-month period, starting on Aug. 1. Look for the new rates at www.CommunityPowerNH.gov, the PUC's rate comparison web page, or in the weekly town email, and review your options to make sure you're where you want to be.

on years of hands-on experience in the muck and mire. The Glines family have been prominent participants in the Canterbury farming community since before the Civil War, so it is hard to imagine any type of Canterbury agricultural activity that doesn't include a Glines farm family representative.

The Agricultural Commission now has a vacant position and is looking for volunteers who have an interest in preserving and promoting agriculture in Canterbury. If you have farming in your background or in your blood and would consider serving on this commission, please contact one of our members. We'll be happy to answer any questions you might have.

July and August are good months to explore the farmers markets, and the on-the-farm farm stands for the freshly harvested fruits and vegetables now coming into season. Don't forget the eggs, meats, honey and maple syrup also being locally produced and sold. Supporting our local farmers is a good way to enjoy our rural community and keep agriculture alive in Canterbury.

Visit canterburyhistory.org: We are in the process of uploading photos taken from the albums of all the productions of the Canterbury Players Gilbert & Sullivan shows presented in the 1980s and 1990s. Many folks have fond memories of attending these shows featuring Canterbury residents performing (as best they could).
